Josselin H [REDACTED], A NUMBER [REDACTED]

I, Josselin H [REDACTED] (A number [REDACTED]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is June 29th, 2005. I am 13 years old. My mother and I are from Honduras.
2. We left the country because my mom was working at a shop and they threatened her. She was really scared and did not know what to do. Eventually the place she worked shut down and so we were not able to afford living there anymore so we had to leave the country.
3. We presented ourselves at the border about June 25th, 2018. We were taken to what they call "The Freezer". There were no beds at all there any everyone had to sleep on the cold cement. I was able to have my mother with me the whole time but many mothers were not able to. It was so cold where we were staying that we could not sleep or rest. We were given small aluminum blankets. One blanket was for me and one was for my mother. We were not allowed to shower while we were there. The toilets were very dirty. Sometimes there was toilet paper but sometimes there was not. There was not usually water for us to wash our hands. We did not have toothbrushes.
4. There was a small container of juice and sandwiches that were very small. We were very hungry. It was painful how hungry we were. The sandwiches they gave us were still frozen and when I tried to eat it made me nauseous so I was not able to eat it and neither was my mother.
5. It was extremely cold at this place and we were not able to sleep because of how cold it was. The air conditioning was turned on very high and it was pointed right above where I was sleeping.
6. The lights were always on. We were not given anything to clean ourselves or allowed to shower. A lot of the times we could not wash our hands after going to the bathroom. Sometimes they would have a little water for us to wash our hands but not always.
7. After 5 hours my mother and I were taken to another place where we were held for two days.
8. In "La Perrera" I was separated from my mother as we arrived. I had to go to this other caged area where other children were. I do not understand why but whenever I would try to fall asleep a police would come and kick me in my feet to wake me up. Once I would wake up they would walk away. We had sandwiches and they were still frozen like in the first place. They gave us apples, a small cookie, and water bottles. They only gave us water when it was breakfast, lunch, or dinner. They only gave us small mats to sleep on and all of the mats were touching side-by-side so there was no room to relax my body. I was able to able to shower one time that I stayed there. They had towels and soap for us to use there. It was so cold and I only had one shirt on. After staying here for two days we were then transported in a bus. In the bus the police did not yell at us and they were nice. I was not able to be with my mother again until we were in the bus.

9. I have not yet received legal notice or access to counsel but I have an appointment to speak to someone in the visitor's center soon.
10. My mother and I were taken out of that facility on the 26th of June, 2018.
11. My mother and I have been at the location in Dilley for about 3 days. It was a four or five hour trip by bus. In this experience in this facility in Dilley I am treated very well and in comparison to where we stayed before I feel like I can finally relax. My mother and I can finally sleep. I have not been here for very long but the facility has beds and better food that we can eat.
12. We are planning to stay with my aunt in Florida.
13. My mom and I do not know anything about my case yet. I only know that they have told me that I will be able to meet with someone to discuss my case. I have plans to speak with them soon.

KEYLIN M [REDACTED], A NUMBER [REDACTED]

I, KEYLIN M [REDACTED] (A number [REDACTED]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is December 19, 2001, and I am sixteen years old. My mother's name is [REDACTED] [REDACTED], and her A number is [REDACTED]. Her date of birth is December 3, 1979. My mother and I are from Honduras.
2. We left our country, because my mother's life had been threatened, and she had been held up at gunpoint three times.
3. We presented ourselves at the border about eight days ago, June 21, 2018. We were taken to the Custom and Border Patrol Facility in McAllen, Texas, which we call the Ice Box.
4. The Ice Box was freezing, and my mother and I were shivering the entire time. I was miserable from the cold.
5. We were given food, but the food was frozen and not fit for consumption. It smelled so bad that we went hungry instead of eating it. My mother and I were hungry the entire time we were at the Ice Box.
6. After about one day, my mother and I were taken to another facility, known as the Dog House, where we held for four days. We were immediately separated at the Dog House and stayed separated the entire time. We were allowed to talk to each other only once for ten minutes in the four days we were there.
7. I was very frightened and depressed the entire time. I was scared of the guards and scared I would be deported without my mother. I did not know where she was. I am still depressed. I also have nightmares and a lot of anxiety because of the separation.
8. The female guards yelled at me and the other girls a lot. They called us names and made fun of us. The female guards would not let us and kicked us with their boots to keep us awake. They also called the some of the girls filthy and told them not to throw anything on the floor the way they would at home in their country. The female guards made me and the other girls strip naked in front of them and leered at us before their showers. It was very uncomfortable and caused me a lot of anxiety. I am still fearful of the guards today because of my treatment at the Dog Pound.
9. The guards were really angry all the time, and we tried to stay quiet and not attract their attention.
10. The Dog House is even colder than the Ice Box, and I was shivering the entire time. I was so cold that I had severe pain in my leg. I did not tell the guards, because they told us that if we said we were hurt that we would have to stay at the Dog House longer.

11. The guards also would not allow us to keep the mylar blankets that people gave use when they were leaving because they said we were only allowed one blanket. We received no mattress pads.
12. My leg hurt so bad form the cold that I hid one of the extra blankets so that I could wrap it around my leg. This made me very scared because the guards said they would punish us if we took extra blankets.
13. The food at the Dog House was the same as at the Ice House. It was frozen and smelled bad. I did not eat it, and I went hungry the entire time I was there.
14. I did not have any toothpaste or a toothbrush the entire time I was at the Dog House.
15. The bathrooms at the Dog House were dirty and disgusting. I was told to continue to use them and not to make the bathrooms dirtier, even though the toilets were already overflowing.
16. I was muddy and wet when I was apprehended, but I was not allowed to shower or change for five days. I was told that detainees were only allowed one shower the entire time they were at the facility.
17. I was housed in dog cages and I was constantly moved. This made me fearful for my safety and makes me scared today whenever a guard tells me I have to move.
18. After four days we were moved to another Ice Box, where I was reunited with my mother. We stayed there for one day, but we were not given food or water the entire day.
19. After one day, we were moved to another Dog House that was different than the first one. We stayed at this Dog House for one day and night. We were separated again immediately when we arrived at the second Dog House.
20. The second Dog House had the same gross food as the first – frozen sandwiches that smelled bad. Again, we did not eat much and went hungry the entire time.
21. After the second Dog House, we were moved to the Dilley facility.
22. There are no current plans for our release.

DIXIANA S [REDACTED], A NUMBER [REDACTED]

I, DIXIANA S [REDACTED] (A number [REDACTED]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is January 25, 2008. I am from Honduras.
2. My mother says we crossed the Rio Grande near the Mexican city of Reynosa and were apprehended as we walked along the river near a bridge on our way to McAllen, Texas. My mother says that it was on or about May 23, 2018, and that we were taken to a facility called the "Hielera" or "Freezer."
3. Upon arrival at this facility, the officials separated me from my mother. I was placed with female girls from 5 to 6 years old to fifteen or 16 years old. There were large numbers of girls, some of whom had to sleep on concrete and sitting up because there wasn't sufficient room in the cell. I slept on the floor in a passage way where I could find room. It was around midnight, and I was given an aluminum blanket. There were no mattresses. I had difficulty reaching the bathroom, because I didn't want to push through other girls and wake them. When I did go to the bathroom, there was no door or separation between the toilets. The lights were on all night.
4. When I arrived, they gave me a cookie and juice. For breakfast, they gave me a frozen ham sandwich. The ham was black. I took one bite, but did not eat the rest because of the taste. They also gave me blue colored water. I saved this for later and someone stole it from me while I was sleeping.
5. I was very scared that I would never see my mother again. I cried. Most of the other girls with me were also crying. Another girl, who was about 16 or 17, had a baby and both her and the baby were crying.
6. Although there was a water dispenser in my cell, there was no water. Other girls requested water from an officer, and the officer said he would bring water, but never did. I was very thirsty.
7. After about twelve hours in the facility, I was put back with mother on a bus that took us to the facility called the "Perrera" or Dog House. We were there three or four days. When we arrived at the facility, they separated me again from my mother. I could see my mom far away in another cell.
8. When I arrived, I was put in the cell with girls who had not bathed who were 10 years or older. I bathed on the first day. There were separated showers, and I was given clean clothes. My dirty clothes were cleaned and returned to me.
9. While I was in the cell with the bathed girls, I was half asleep and they were calling a girl who had a similar first name as me. A male officer kicked me to wake me up to confirm whether or not I was the person they were looking for. I was not. The kick scared me and hurt, although I did not get a bruise.
10. They left a cookie jar full of cookies that we could eat at any time. For breakfast, I had a burrito with egg and rice, a granola bar, an apple, a cup of milk, a bottle of water and a bag of potato chips. For lunch, I had a burrito, an apple, a bottle of water, and another bag of potato chips. For dinner, I had a ham sandwich with lettuce, an apple, a bottle of water and a bag of potato chips. The food was the same every day. I saved my potato chips and someone stole them from me when I slept.

11. I didn't cry the first day when I was at this facility, but I began crying all of the time on the second and third day because I missed my mother. The majority of the other girls in my cell were also crying the whole time I was there. A male officer told me I would be able to see my mother at 6 pm for an hour and to stop crying.
12. The lights were always on. There were no windows, and I didn't know whether it was day or not. I asked what time it was when the officer told me I could see my mom at 6 pm, but he said he was not permitted to tell me what time it was. I never got to see my mom until we left the facility and I was put on a bus with my mom.
13. My mom says I left this facility on May 28, 2018 and that we have been at the ICE Dilley, Texas facility for over a month. I got chicken pox at this facility. They have given me medication for the chicken pox, as well as for an infection I had in my molar.

Declaration of Justin L [REDACTED]

I, Justin L [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and complete to the best of my knowledge and recollection:

1. My name is Justin L [REDACTED] [REDACTED] My date of birth is May 18, 2005. I am 13 years old. I lived in Apopa, El Salvador, with my mother until May 30, 2018, when I left on my own for the United States. I am currently detained in CBP's Urcula detention center in McAllen, Texas.
3. I entered the United States by crossing the river on Wednesday, June 13, 2018. I do not remember the exact time, but it was in the evening. After I crossed, I went in search of US immigration police to turn myself in. I walked for about an hour and a half before I found an immigration patrol.

4. The immigration patrol searched me and put my belt and shoelaces in a plastic bag. They gave me a receipt for these belongings. Other than those things, the only other possessions I had were the clothes I was wearing. I had a copy of my birth certificate with me when I left El Salvador, but I lost it in Mexico.
5. The immigration police transferred me to a CBP holding cell in the same town where I am now. I think I may have arrived at 7:00pm, but I am not sure.
6. The police put me in a cell with a lot of other kids. It was very crowded and very dirty. There was trash on the ground. They kept calling people to leave and putting others in, so the number changed all the time, but sometimes I counted 40 other kids. Sometimes 32, and a few times fewer than that.

7. I did not receive a blanket. There were no mattresses. We slept directly on the floor. I am not used to this. The dirt from our clothes was on the floor, and it felt very uncomfortable to have to sit on the dirty ground.
8. It was cold, very cold. I only had a t-shirt, so I pulled my hands inside my shirt to try to keep warm.
9. There were two other 13-year-old boys in the cell with me at the start, but they left soon after. The other kids were all 15 and above.
10. I was in the cell for about 17 hours in all - I mean in the detention center where the cell was. We had to move to another cell twice for cleaning, and police came in four times to check names. All these checks along with the times they called people out or put more in meant that it was very difficult to sleep. I think I slept 3²³⁶ hours.

in all out of the 17 hours I was there.

11. The food we received in that jail was a sandwich and a drink in a plastic bottle. They also gave us some crackers or cookies, but I didn't like them because they had peanuts. I didn't like the sandwich either, but I ate them. We only had food at certain times, and I was hungry in between meals, and there were no snacks in between meals.

12. There was water in the cell, in a large plastic Thermos. It tasted funny, like chlorine, like it came from a pool. I only drank from it twice because I didn't trust it. I don't think people really believed that water was clean. A lot of other boys didn't drink it. It made me feel funny in my stomach the times I drank it.

13. It was not possible to bathe or shower in that place. I tried to

Wash my face with water and wet my hair. I am really not used to going without bathing or combing my hair, so this was very strange and uncomfortable for me. They also did not give us toothbrushes or toothpaste, so we went the whole time without brushing until I came to the place I am now.

14. The toilet was in the cell with us separated by a little wall. I felt ashamed to use it because there was no privacy. It was uncomfortable to use the toilet with people just on the other side of the wall.

15. The immigration police never explained anything to me. I never knew when they would call me. When they finally called me last night to leave the cell, I thought maybe they were letting me out and I might see my family.

16. I haven't been able to call my father since I was locked up. I want to tell

him where I am, and I want to talk to him. Nobody from immigration has said anything to me about talking to my family. I'm afraid to ask because the officials aren't very nice.

17 Here is the place I am now it is a bit more comfortable because we have more space, we get blankets and mattresses, and the food is better. Here we get apples and better crackers and cookies, and instead of sandwiches we get tortillas wrapped around rice and beans. The toilets here are separate from the cages where we sleep. They still only have a ~~wall~~ ^{partial} wall, but at least we are not using the toilets right next to people who are sleeping.

18 The immigration police transferred me yesterday, June 14, 2018, in the evening to the place I am now. It was the first time I had seen the sky in 17 hours. I didn't know what time it was

until then, but I saw that the sky was dark, and I heard a woman say in English that it was 12:20, so it was just after midnight, on June 15. I don't know what time it is now, and I didn't even know ~~where~~ it is already morning until I asked the lawyer taking this statement because the lights here are always on.

BRANDON S [REDACTED]

I, **BRANDON S** [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is August 1, 2003, I am 14. I am from Guastatoya, Guatemala.
2. My family left Guatemala because we feared for our lives. My father supported a local man who was running for sheriff. The man became sheriff and gave my father a job. My father did not like working for the sheriff, so he quit. Two weeks later, my father moved to the United States for a new job. The sheriff was upset that my dad quit and moved to the United States. Two or three months later, I was at home with my mother and brothers when someone shot five bullets at my house. The next day, my mom submitted an application for Mexican visas. We got the visas a couple of months later and left Guatemala a few weeks later once we finished the school year. We took the bus from Guatemala to Tijuana and stayed in Tijuana for one night before presenting ourselves at the border.
3. My mother, my two brothers and I presented ourselves at the border on July 4, 2018 around 3:00 in the afternoon. We were taken to the San Ysidro Facility. I was separated from my mother and youngest brother. The guards then placed in a room with my older brother and about seven (6) other young men, all under the age of eighteen. I was given a thin mattress and one blanket.
4. Around 3:30pm after I arrived, I was given a cheeseburger and some apple juice. I was given the same thing for dinner around 7:00pm. Around 11:00pm or 12:00am, I was given a bologna and cheese sandwich. We have access to water at all times. I am usually hungry between my meals, but I have not been given any snacks. I like meal time because that is the only time I get to see my mom and younger brother.
5. There is air conditioning in the room and it is very cold all day. I have to use my blanket all of the time. I would like another blanket, but I am not comfortable asking for one.
6. The lights in the room are very bright and are on all day and night. There are no windows to the outside, so I don't know what time it is. My brother and I talk about how frustrating it is. Since I arrived, I have not been able to shower or brush my teeth. There is no soap in my room and no towels. I had a toothbrush when I came here, but they took it away when I got to the facility. No one has allowed me to brush my teeth and no one has told me when I will be able to take a shower.

I am from Honduras, born 11-19-2000.

Have nothing in Honduras. Father first refused to acknowledge baby. But then he started asking for him he wanted to take the baby.

I am afraid of him. He drinks & is involved in drugs - uses.

No police or law enforcement in my town. He could take him & there would be nothing I could do so I came to join my sister Sister - Glenda E [REDACTED] 26²⁷ y.o. - She came because husband was abusing her & stalking her when she tried to leave.

~~They have not given me any information~~
I traveled from Honduras by train - on top of the train - with my 1-yr old. We slept out in the open, where we could. When we got to the border we crossed the river with a group of migrants I found on the way. I paid \$20 to get information on how to cross the river & which way to go to find border patrol.

I knew nothing about where or how to find a port of entry. We walked about 2 hrs after crossing the river looking for border patrol & it was very hot. When we saw border patrol we waived them down & waited for them to come to us. They took us to the bridge - where we had crossed & now there were people there. - Then they brought us all here.

They have treated us well. But there is no where to sleep. We sleep on the concrete floor. Me and my one-year-old. It is not good for the children. There is no food for my baby - only formula/milk. At home he ate beans, mashed potatoes, rice. Here he has not had anything except formula. It is cold. For me there is food.

They give me bread & juice for him but he only drinks the juice.

They have not told me anything about my rights or my child's rights. They have not given me any info.

There are diapers & now I know but at first no one told me & I did not know what to do.

They ~~then~~ asked me if I had a contact here and where I was headed.

I told them & they called my sister. They let me talk to my sister.

They asked for my sister's address + she gave it to them. I don't know what else they asked her.

They asked her for my info + whether she knew I was coming + whether she helped me to come. She knew I was coming ~~but~~ + helped me at home but I came on my own.

Here they have not told me anything about what will happen.

I, Anet M [redacted] (A number - - -), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is 7/24/2002. I am from Mexico, Chiapas. I am 15 years old.

2. I/we left Mexico because the gangs wanted me to be with them. I said no. They said they would kill me. There are lots of gangs in Chiapas.

3. I presented myself at the border/was apprehended at around 2:00 a.m (time). I believe that it was on or about 6/28/18 (date). I was taken to El Centro Border Patrol facility (facility).

4. This morning around 9:00, the officials here gave me some papers to sign. I said I would not sign because I did not want to go back. I want to know what my rights are. They said you have to sign someday. They did not explain the papers.

5. I told the officials I wanted to seek asylum. They told me I could not get asylum because I am a minor. They said that when I get back to Mexico, I can go to the U.S. consulate and tell them that I need asylum.

6. I am two months pregnant. I told the officials I am pregnant.

7. I did not receive any information about lawyers or legal services. I asked to speak to a lawyer + they said no.
8. At 9:00 am. I was given a bean burrito. This was the first food I received. I was told I would get another burrito at night. I did not get any juice or milk.
9. The room I am being held in has only three mattresses. 18 women are in this room. Three are teenagers/minors. The others are women. We have 15 ~~the~~ sheets of mylon. We asked for more mattresses, but the officials said no. Some of us sleep on the benches, some on the mattresses, some on the cement floor. I slept on the floor. It was very cold.
10. There is a toilet and sink in the room, with half-walls. There is no privacy.
11. The lights stayed on all night.
12. No one asked me if I had family here. I was not offered a chance to call any one.

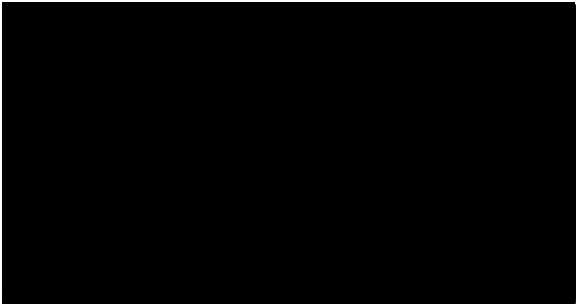
I, TIMOFEI F [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is March 5th, 2003. I am from Russia. My mother's name is [REDACTED] and my father's name is [REDACTED]. I do not know of any other relatives I may have here in the United States, but I know of an organization, Jehovah's Witnesses, that operates all over the world.
2. I am a Jehovah's Witness, as is my family, and the government prohibits my organization from existing in Russia. If anyone finds out I am a Jehovah's Witness I believe I will be jailed for ten years. I am very afraid of that. I do not remember when we left Russia, but it was approximately a month ago. I just learned that it is July, 6, but I thought it was still June.
3. I am detained here with my mother, who's in a different room and my father also arrived here with us. I believe my father is also here, not in the same room with me, but in the last four days I saw him once, when the officer let us meet.
4. My mother and I took a plane to New York. My father went to Tijuana by himself, and we were planning to reunite as a family once we were all in the U.S. My father was waiting in a long line to cross the border. From New York, my mother and I flew to either San Diego or San Ysidro. My mother and I decided to meet him in Tijuana, where he was in line, so we could be together as a family. My father did not have a visa, and my mother and I had tourist visas. They told us once we entered the San Ysidro Pedestrian facility, the visas my mother and I had was no longer valid.
5. We were waiting in line and our number was 320. We waited for several days in this line, however during that time, my mother, who speaks English, went back to San Ysidro several times during the waiting period and eventually we crossed the border by foot. When we crossed we explained that my mother and I have tourist visas. I can barely remember dates about the crossing or about the trip, I haven't looked at the calendar, and do not know even what the date is today.
6. We all three of us are Jehovah's Witnesses and are being prosecuted in Russia, and we're all asking for asylum. On my second day in this facility I met with my dad for fifteen minutes in an unknown place inside this camp. We did not meet in a room, it was more like a corridor, and there were chairs in that corridor. That was the only time I saw my father in this facility. We got lucky yesterday and my mother and I were able to eat together. I saw her several times, either eating together or she asks the officer to come see me. Every time we see each other we eat together.

7. My body hurts because we have to sleep on hard mats. The reason my body hurts is that we're crowded and we have to sleep in uncomfortable positions. It's really hard for me to measure, I cannot really think about it in meters or feet right now, but it's very crowded. If people were standing with arms outstretched touching fingers, the room would be two people by three people in length/width. There are only teenagers in my room, but recently there have been two new boys aged 12 and 13. I believe it's a mistake they were placed in our room. I asked the ages from some of the teenagers and the oldest was 17 years old. I have a blanket, I think made of wool, but it barely fits my body. Thankfully I have four layers of clothing. The cafeteria is about eight by twelve people outstretched. There are 50 people at a time in there and there are not enough seats for everybody. Some people stand and some people sit on the floor. Approximately 15 people do not have seats.
8. I eat four times a day. The first time between 5:00-7:00 am, the second time around noon, the third time around 4:00 pm, and finally around 10:00 pm. The food is not freshly made, it's likely frozen. The food is lukewarm, it's not really warm and it's not really cold, it's room temperature. For breakfast there are usually burritos or cereal, but they do not taste good. I cannot eat them. For lunch there's usually a sandwich and then there are hamburgers for the other two meals and with all meals there is a juice, either a mixed juice or apple juice. One time we ate breakfast without juice. We do not get a choice of juice, we just get any one. Because we are not doing any physical activity here, I have enough food.
9. All day we are in a locked room. However, twice a day our room gets cleaned and we're moved to the kitchen. All I do is eat, sleep, and try to learn Spanish. There is only one window in the room and all we see is an empty corridor. I have not seen sunlight since I have been staying in the camp.
10. The ventilation here makes it very cold throughout the entire camp.
11. Twenty-four hours a day there are one or two big light panels turned on all the time. I cannot tell the difference between night and day. I can only estimate time of day based on what I eat. In my room there is one bathroom and it has no door and the sides are shaky, and they're not really walls. There is one bathroom with one toilet and no shower. There are from five to twelve people, depending on how many people arrive at night and how many people leave in the morning. There is no soap in the bathroom. Sometimes I'm provided a single-use toothbrush that has a tiny bit of toothpaste on it, but I don't always get that. On the second day I did not get a toothbrush at all. The toothbrush is only a sponge on a stick. On the first day I they offered us the opportunity to take a shower but not on the second or third day. I have not taken a shower since I arrived at the camp. I'm still wearing the clothes I came in with. I never imagined in my entire life that I would find myself in these circumstances, in this type of place.
12. There are two situations that I consider to be the worst here. The first is that I'm separated from my mother and father. That really wears me down and weighs on my soul. The other situation that has been really difficult for me was that yesterday a teenager who crossed the border illegally was put into my room and he was very angry and when he found out that I was from Russia he started to bully me in Spanish. He did not let me sleep. He did not try to hurt me physically but he was making fun of the fact that I was Russian and laughing at me. Nobody supervises us. Sometimes, very rarely, officers will walk through the hallways. There are also cameras in the room. The only word that people around me know in Russian is how to say 'Hi.' I do not talk to anyone in my room, and only one of them speaks English.

13. My family and I have not been in other facilities.
14. I do not remember and I do not know if I was provided writings about my legal rights. I do not remember any documents. I am being kept separately from my mother and from my father. The only banner I have seen is that the mats we sleep on need to be organized, and I have received no other instructions.
15. My family and I have been at the San Ysidro Pedestrian facility for about four days.
16. I have not been told when I will be released from here. I want to add that the circumstances for the men are much worse. They sleep on blankets and have to cover themselves with plastic bags. I walked by their room and there was a window into the room for the men. Also, when they clean our rooms and we're moved to the kitchen I saw men in their room holding their rugs or blankets and plastic bags with them. Only 10 of the 50 people in there have the mats.

Because I am a Jehovah's witness, I am prohibited from swearing. Therefore, I must provide an oath to tell the truth, but put it in a different phrasing than is usually used by the Court. I am allowed to promise but not swear. I take a promise to tell the truth very seriously. I, TIMOFEI [REDACTED] promise under penalty of perjury that the above declaration is true and complete to the best of my abilities. This declaration was provided in English, a language in which I am not fluent, but was read back to me in Russian, a language in which I am fluent.

I, Cesar A [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following statement is true and complete to the best of my knowledge and recollection:

1. My name is Cesar A [REDACTED]. My date of birth is September 28, 2005. I am 12 years old. I am from El Salvador and I lived in San Vicente, El Salvador, with my grandmother and my 15-year-old brother David A [REDACTED] until he and I decided to leave El Salvador on our own for the United States.
2. We left on May 28, 2018, and reached the United States on June 13, 2018. We entered the United States by crossing the river. We wanted to turn ourselves in to an immigration patrol, so we walked until we saw a vehicle that was white with green marks, and we approached it.

3 The immigration agents called a small bus to come and take us to a place where we were registered and placed in cells. My brother and I were separated, and I went into a cell for younger boys. My cell had boys aged 6 to 12. There were about 11 kids in my cell, all boys.

4 Our clothes were still wet from crossing the river when we entered the cell. Each of us had a sheet that was sort of metallic, but I still felt cold because my clothes were wet. There were no mats, so we sat either on the concrete ground or on cement benches along the walls. We stayed there like that and slept there.

5 My brother and I spent 24 hours in that place. For food, we had a sandwich, some juice, and I also received some crackers. It

Really wasn't enough food for me. I was hungry in between meals, even though I ate every time the food came. There were no snacks in between meals.

6 Here the food is much better. Here we get apples, and the other food is much better.

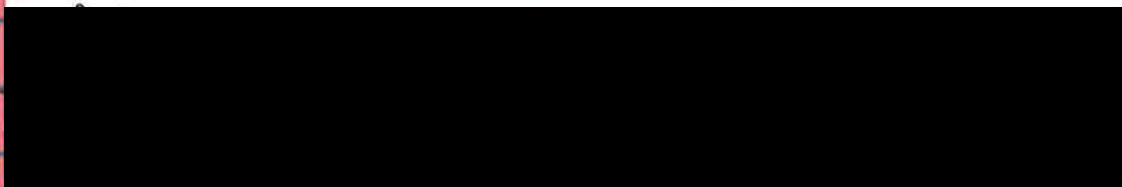
7 The place I am now with my brother has chain dividers like cages. My brother and I are together. We have been here since sometime yesterday evening.

8 I haven't talked to my parents since I have been here. I really want to speak to them.

9 I haven't received any information about when we will leave and what happens next.

I, Kevin U [REDACTED]
[REDACTED] declare that the following is true to the best of my knowledge and recollection:

1. My name is Kevin U [REDACTED]
[REDACTED] I was born on October 14, 2000, in San Salvador, El Salvador. I am 17 years old. I lived in San Salvador until May 28, 2018, when I left on my own to come to the United States.
2. I spent about 13 days in transit. I crossed the river into the United States yesterday, June 13, 2018, at about 6:00 or 7:00 pm. I walked for about an hour and a half before I was apprehended by US immigration officials.
3. The immigration agents had us take off our shoes and show our documents. They had us get

most of our belongings into a plastic bag. They let me keep my birth certificate and a ticket they gave me as a receipt for my belongings. The belongings they took and stored for me were a necklace with a religious emblem on it, my wallet with about 50 Mexican pesos, my shoes, and photos of my father showing injuries he sustained at the hands of gang members who stabbed him, ~~and my telephone~~

4 Then they called a bus and took us to the CBP holding facility in McAllen, Texas, where I am now. I arrived at the CBP facility at about 10:00 pm.

5 There they searched us again. Somebody searched our bodies. They had us raise our shirts so they could see our chests and backs. They patted us down below the waist. They said this was for security and also to check if we had any injuries.

6. They put me in a cell with something like 26 people in it, all boys under age 18. Most of us were 16 or 17 but there were also some boys who were 13 and 14. They didn't seem to make any special effort to separate the older boys from the younger ones.

7. The cell was very crowded. There were so many of us that we could not stretch out on the ground or the benches. Most of us had to sit upright and stay in one place.

8. When I entered the cell, I was not given a blanket. When some other boys left later, a few of us who didn't have blankets at first took the opportunity to get the one they had used. None of us had mats for sleeping.

9. The temperature in the cell is cold, especially without a blanket. I only have a t-shirt. But you get used to the chill.
10. I didn't sleep most of the night. I wasn't sure if I would be called by the immigration agents, so I spent most of the night alert in case I was called.
11. There are two boys in my cell who don't understand Spanish. They don't understand us when we speak to them when they were going through the registration process, we help them using hand gestures to be able to communicate with immigration officials.
12. There is a toilet in our cell. There is a short wall between it and the rest of the cell, but there are always people close to the entry because there are so many of us in the cell. We put the trash can in

the entry to give a bit of a barrier between the rest of the cell and the toilet. It doesn't feel very comfortable but we manage as best we can. It feels uncomfortable to use the toilet, and we also are conscious that we are making the person who is using the toilet feel uncomfortable.

13. There was no toilet paper in the toilet when I arrived in the cell, but then after I woke up at about 1:00 or 2:00 am I saw that there was paper. There is no soap. We wash our hands just with water.

14. I don't have a toothbrush or toothpaste, and I haven't been given any since I arrived. I have not been allowed to shower or bathe since I have been here.

15. The food we receive is a sandwich with ham and a piece. Last night we also received a cracker with our meal, but not for the other meals. The food isn't really sufficient. It makes me less hungry for a while, but it's not really enough. In between meals, I get hungry. From 7:00 am to 1:00 pm, I have had to wait with no food — it's not possible to get a snack in between meals. I just had to wait.

16 I have not been able to call my family while in this detention facility. I would like to tell them where I am. I'm sure they're waiting to hear from me and are worried about me.

17 I haven't received any information about what happens next. They took my photo and my prints. That's it. Immigration

hasn't given me anything in writing to tell me what happens next with my case. The agents here haven't even told me what the stages in the process are here. They just call us periodically for something. We never know if they need more information or if we're waiting for something. We just don't know what the process is because they don't tell us anything

18 That's why it's hard to sleep. We don't want to fall asleep until we're sure the paperwork is completed, because we're worried we'll miss something.

I, Jeydi M [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. I am Jeydi M [REDACTED] born, March 23, 1989, A# [REDACTED] and my 4-year-old son [REDACTED] (A# [REDACTED]), born February 16, 2014, who was not interviewed and who is on my claim. I am from Progreso Lloro, Honduras.
2. In October 2017, my partner left Honduras taking my daughter with him to the United States.
3. I entered the United States on about June 4, 2018 near Brownsville, Texas. After I crossed into the United States we were detained by U.S. officials about 15 minutes later. The officers demanded my shoelaces, jewelry, and told me to get into a truck. The officer asked me questions about when I came and made me sign several papers. I asked if any of the papers were for my deportation and they said 'no'. Then they drove us to a heiliera.
4. At the heiliera they took my identification and asked me if the child with me was my son, and took us into a very cold room where we had to sleep in the floor with blankets of aluminum. They also took my finger prints, but not my son's. They also asked me questions about why I came to the US and if I had a fear of returning to Honduras. I told them I feared persecution They also gave us a cookie and juice five times in 24 hours. Four times they gave me a sandwich. I stayed in the heiliera one night I think, but because they never turn off the lights I am not sure. There was no possibility to bath or take a shower.
5. The next day we were taken to the Peirerra in a bus. They gave us an apple, sandwich, cookies, juice, and water. I was taking medicine for an injury to my leg. There was no possibility to bath or take a shower, even though there was a shower there. I was at the Peirerra for one night, I think, then I was taken to Dilley.
6. The medical treatment in Dilley is not sufficient. The medicine that I received at Dilley for my leg injury did not stop the pain in my leg, although the medicine that I was taking in Honduras since August 2017 did stop the pain. There are long waits and the medicine they give us is not good. I had to wait for five days to get treatment for my leg. I asked for crutches so I could walk but they would not give them to me. They told me that I could only get crutches if I was admitted in to the medical unit here. My son was coughing, vomiting, and had a fever. They did not give him any medicine for his fever, cough or vomiting. About a week ago my child had a fever and was vomiting, and I went to the clinic, about six times in three days, and the nurses refused to admit my child or provide him any assistance. Only after he saw the doctor, and he confirmed the child had a fever, did my son receive treatment for a fever and conjunctivitis. They gave me an armband that meant that I don't have to wait at the pharmacy because I had to wait for 2 or 3 hours to get medicine before they gave me the armband. They gave me this armband after 20 days.
7. The nurse who first saw my child wrote that my child did not have a fever, but the next person who saw my child, and said he was a doctor, said my son did have a fever.
8. At Dilley, I was interviewed on Monday, June 7, 2018, and explained that I was fleeing my country because I feared harm. I am awaiting my asylum decision.



1. My date of birth is July 2, 2002. I am 15 years old. I am from Mexico.

2. I left Mexico to find work.

3. ~~I was~~ I was apprehended by CBP with my grandfather, Vincenzo A [REDACTED], my sister, Claudia A [REDACTED] (18 y.o.), brother, Leonato A [REDACTED] (17 y.o.), and a family friend. I believe that it was on Monday (June 25, 2018) We were taken to El Centro. We were together for 10 min. and then separated. They did not tell us we would be separated. I was afraid when I was separated from my grandfather. We were not given an opportunity to say goodbye.

4. At the facility, I have access to water. The water is not good. It smells. I have my own cup. I was offered 2 cookies and 2 juice boxes when I arrived. Since then, I have been given 1 burrito and 1 juice, 3 times a day. The burrito is only bean, and is

small, about the length of a pen. I'm hungry, but I only eat a little bit. There are no apples or bananas.

5. The temperature at the facility is a bit cold. I don't know if I have access to a shower.

6. The lights are on bright all night. I have to put my blanket over my head to sleep. I am in a room with 3 other kids. There are 4 of us, and only 3 sleeping pads. The room is approx. 8 x 10 feet. It's cold at night.

7. My grandfather, uncle (friend), sister and brother arrived here on Monday June 25, 2018. My brother and uncle (family friend) left yesterday

8. I did not receive any papers explaining my legal rights. I did not see any notices posted about my legal rights

9. I did not see any telephone or make any phone calls. I was not told I could have a lawyer or given information about speaking with a lawyer.

10. I am being returned to Mexico today. They told me I am going to Mexicali. I do not know if my grandfather or sister are being returned to Mexico also, or if I will go alone.

I, Manuela [redacted] (A number [redacted]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is 10/9/2000. I am from Roatan, Honduras. I am 17 years old.

2. I/we left Honduras because of the drug dealers there. They were threatening me and my grandparents. They told my grandparents to give me to them to work for them, and said that if I did not work for them, they would kill my grandparents. I left Honduras less than a month after the drug dealers started to bother my grandparents about me. It took me approx. 6 months to get here. ~~3. We presented ourselves at the border/were apprehended at around _____ (time). I believe that it was on or about _____ (date). We were taken to _____ (facility).~~

3. I crossed the border near Mexicali on Wednesday, 6/27, at approximately 2 pm. I arrived in this CBP facility at El Centro approximately an hour and a half later, driven by border patrol agents. It is now just after noon on Thursday, 6/28/18. I have been in the El Centro CBP facility for approximately 20.5 hours.

4. The first time I was given food in this facility was at approximately 6 am this morning, 14.5 hours after I arrived. I was given a small burrito, some cookies, and a juice. The burrito had been frozen, and was not cooked enough. It was still frozen in the middle. The meal was not enough food for me. I am still hungry.

5. In the room where I^{#21161} am staying, there is a cooler of water. The water tastes like Clorox. There are no cups in the room where I am staying to use for water. The people in the room use old juice bottles to drink from, after they are given those juice bottles for a meal. I received my first juice bottle at approximately 6 am this morning, and did not drink any water before then.

6. I am being kept in a room with 12 other boys, ages 15-18 (approximately). We have 3 cushions and 4 or 5 blankets between us. I do not have a blanket. Five of us are able to sleep on the cushions at a time, because we push the 3 cushions together and sleep close together. Others sleep on the two benches that are on the walls, or on the floor. It is cold for me in the room, without a blanket. There is nothing to do in the room: no books or games. The room is approximately 12 ft by 7 or 8 ft. The cushions are approximately 3 feet wide. I understand feet as a unit of measurement because I worked as a carpenter in Honduras.

7. The bathroom in the room where I am staying is dirty. It has not been cleaned since I arrived. I have not been given an opportunity to shower since I arrived.

8. Since I arrived here, ^{#21162} no one has given me any papers to keep. To my knowledge, I have not seen any written notice of my legal rights. I have signed a paper, but I did not understand it, because ~~it~~ it was written in English, which I do not read. No one explained the paper to me. I have not been told or shown a list of free legal services.
9. I don't think I am allowed to use a phone here. I did give the people who work here the phone number of my aunt who lives in Florida. A man who works here called her in my presence. She told him that I could go to her.
10. I have not been told anything about what will happen to me next.
11. I told a man here that I was afraid to return to my country because of the drug dealers threatening my grandparents and me. He told me that he didn't care what happened to me in my country, and that those problems were my country's problems. I think that man's name was W. Menendez (or Melendez).
12. The men who work here are very tough / mean. The same man also called me a "burro," which means a donkey or stupid person. He also told me that ³⁷⁰ they don't want stupid people like me here ^{bothering their country} (3)

I don't think he took any notes of my statement.

13. I feel lonely here and I want to speak with my aunt.

I, ALMA S [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is February 25, 2002. I am 16 years old. I am from Mexico.

2. Describe Reason for leaving country of origin.

There is a lot of crime and kidnapping in the area where I am from. Six months ago, my cousin was kidnapped for ransom and our family could not pay. My aunt had to flee her home and my cousin has not been found. We believe that he is probably dead. My family and I are afraid to return.

3. We presented ourselves at the border on July 4, 2018 at approximately 10 am. We were taken to the San Ysidro – Pedestrian West Facility.

4. In the time that I have been here, I have had four meals per day. For lunch, we have had a cold ham and cheese or cold cheese sandwich. The sandwich is served with carrots and juice. At midnight last night, I was offered cold cereal and milk. On July 5th, we were given breakfast at 8 in the morning. Breakfast was a burrito with beans, ham and potatoes – the burrito was room temperature. When the burrito was served, there were not any carrots or juice served at the same time. I have not had any hot meals since arriving yesterday. I am often hungry.

5. There are three bathrooms in the room. There is a half wall between the toilets but there is no door in front of the toilet. There is toilet paper. There is a sink to wash hands but there is no soap and there are no paper towels. There is access to feminine hygiene products. I have not been provided with a toothbrush or deodorant.

6. The temperature inside the room is very cold. No one asked for the temperature to be adjusted. It is difficult to sleep because of the temperature.

7. The lights are on all of the time and it makes it difficult to sleep.

8. There is no window to the outside. There is a window in the door to the room but no window to the outside.

9. I am in a room with my mother and my four siblings. The floor is concrete. There is no window other than a small window in the door. The room is quite small. There are approximately 50 people in the room – 20 of them are adults. There is not enough room for everyone to put their mat down and sleep at the same time - some people put their mats in the bathroom area because there is not enough room. It is difficult to sleep because people are very close together. The door is locked and I do not feel free to leave.

10. I have not had the opportunity to shower since I arrived. I have not been given the opportunity to clean my clothes and I have not been given the opportunity to change into the clean clothes that I have brought with me.

11. I have not, and I don't think that my mother has, received any information regarding my legal rights. I have not been advised of my right to a hearing or my right to see a judge. I have not been given any information regarding free legal services that may be available to me.

12. My family and I have been at the San Ysidro – Pedestrian West Facility for about 2 days. We are planning to contact my uncle who lives in California. No one has given us the opportunity to call him or otherwise contact him. No one has asked me if I am afraid to return to my home country. They took my fingerprints.





Declaration of Sergio C [REDACTED]

1. My name is Sergio C [REDACTED] my birthday is December 6, 2001. I am from Guatemala.
2. I came to the U.S. with my father. My mother passed away 8 years ago. We presented ourselves at the border in McAllen, Texas, in the night, approximately 45 days ago. After we had been in Texas for half an hour, my father and I were detained. Very soon after we were detained, we were taken to a facility. Within half an hour of arriving at that facility I was separated from my father. First, they took away all of our belongings that we had with us. Then, we were separated into groups. I could see my father but we were in different groups. I was worried when we weren't in the same group. Then they started putting us into vehicles. When I left, and my dad wasn't with me, they told me not to worry that he would be coming in a moment. I went in the car and felt very relieved and happy that he would follow. But it wasn't like that. He didn't come. I haven't seen him since then.
3. The second day, they put me in the "hielera." That is when I found out I would not be seeing my father. They told me that I was going to a better place than my father was – that where my father was going he they don't give you clothes and look after you like they do at Casa Padre. I was very sad when they told me this. I never knew I could be separated from my father. I am also very worried about him because I do not know where he is. I was also very worried because I did not know what the conditions are where he is located.
4. I was not able to speak with my father until I had been at Casa Padre for about one month. I have now spoken with him twice. Since I only have ten minutes to talk with him, it is not enough time to talk about what I can do to help him and myself. He told me Monday last week that he is miserable and all of his belongings are gone – he has nothing. The clothes he has left are torn and he is not given anything to eat. I worry about him every day and every night. I do not want him to suffer any longer. I can't sleep very well at all because I worry so much about my family. I have only spoken with my father a total of 20 minutes in these 45 days, and did not speak with any family at all for one month. I had absolutely no idea what was going on and have been very scared.
5. My grandmother is taking care of my four little brothers and sisters in Guatemala. I also have an aunt that lives in Guatemala. Because my grandmother does not have a telephone, I have to call my aunt to get in touch with my family. I have only spoken to my aunt once. For a long time, I had no contact with them because I didn't know their phone number. I cannot read or write. Remembering numbers is hard. Recently my case worker said they had my aunt's phone number, and I was very happy to talk to her. But I am also sad, because I found out that now my grandmother is sick and my little brothers and sisters are crying for me and our dad.
6. One night I was crying in the bathroom because I was so worried about my family and I didn't know where my dad was or how he was. A staff member here at Casa Padre came in and asked me why I was

being such a cry baby. Then he said some words in English that I didn't understand but other young men who where there told me he said swear words. It made me feel very bad and very ashamed.

7. Nobody has every talked about my legal rights as to my own case with me. I had never heard of the Flores case until today when attorneys spoke with me about it. I have never been told I have options to leave. I was given a folder with some papers in it after I agreed to speak with attorneys, but since I cannot read I did not understand any of it.
8. When I first got to Casa Padre, the food was not very good. Mostly beans and soup. After a week or so, we started having more variety of food to eat.
9. When I last spoke with my father, he told me that his case had not gone well. He told me that he was going to have to leave but he wants me to go with him. We want to leave the U.S. together. That conversation was last week and I have not heard anything new. I have no idea what is going on. I feel helpless and have no idea what to do. I just know that as soon as possible I want to be out of here and with my family. I do not want to be here anymore, especially since I know how much my father is suffering. The way I have been treated makes me feel like I don't matter, like I am trash.



I, **Elmer S** [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is February 4, 2003, and I was born in Choluteca, Honduras. I am fifteen years old.
2. I arrived at the border by myself about January 20, 2018 and swam across the river into Brownsville, Texas. Twenty minutes after I crossed into the United States, an immigration official apprehended me and took me to a very cold facility. I spent the night there and then immigration officials took me to a facility where they put me in a cage. After some hours, immigration officials transferred me to IES Los Fresnos. I spent twenty-eight days in IES Los Fresnos, and then on about February 20, 2018, immigration officials transferred me to Casa Esperanza. On June 8, 2018, immigration officials brought me to Casa Padre.
3. Even though Casa Esperanza is a staff secure facility, the conditions at Casa Esperanza were better than the conditions here at Casa Padre. For example, here at Casa Padre, they do not give us enough food and I am always hungry. Also, here at Casa Padre, they do not let us go to the doctor when we ask. Today, I asked to go to the doctor at 7:30 a.m. during physical education because I have a sore throat, I had a headache and feel a cough coming. I didn't sleep last night because I felt sick, but they did not let me go to the doctor and made me continue exercising for an hour.
4. I have also needed to go to the dentist since I have gotten here because I have cavities on the right side of my mouth that have not been filled. Because of the cavities, I am not able to eat well because I can only chew on the left side of the mouth and the cavities are very painful. I had an appointment to see the dentist when I was at Casa Esperanza, but Casa Padre canceled it when I got here and have not rescheduled. I am still waiting to see the dentist since I got here over a month ago.
5. One reason that we get sick so much here at Casa Padre is because we are constantly being taken out of a very cold facility and then sent outside in the hot sun where there is no shade. We are taken out from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m., and then from 4:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Though we should be able to spend more time outside for our wellbeing, the 2 hours that we do spend are unbearable because due to the scorching heat and lack of shade. We are not provided any sunscreen and when we ask to stay inside to protect ourselves from the sun we are not allowed.
6. The clothes that we receive here are not suitable to the temperatures in the facility. Because I came to the United States in the winter, I have a sweat shirt, but most kids do not have sweaters. The blankets we have in our room are very thick and not sufficient to keep us comfortable at night when the facility is the coldest.
7. Since I have been in detention, I have been able to speak to my mother for about ten minutes each call, twice a week. I speak to my mother in a small booth with a window. Although the door to the booth is closed, center staff wait outside, and I do not feel completely at ease speaking with my mother.
8. Speaking to my mother for ten minutes a week is not enough. It takes me four or five minutes just to ask her how she is doing, but then I do not have enough time to get to speak with my father.
9. If I go over the ten minutes I'm given to speak with my parents, I will get in trouble with the center staff. The center staff have told me that they will write me up. The staff has told me that all write ups will

delay reunification with our relatives. All write ups are also placed in a portal, and center staff have told me that the immigration judge can see the reports in the portal. I am afraid that if I speak longer than 10 minutes or get any type of write up the immigration judge will see the write up in the portal and will not look favorable on my immigration case.

10. I am also able to speak with my sponsor, my uncle [REDACTED] but I have to choose whether I speak to my parents or my sponsor. If I were able to speak more to my sponsor, I'd feel more at ease because I could speak to him about my reunification.
11. I have never tried to leave the facility because if you try to escape, center staff have said that you will not receive any help from ORR. This means that you will not receive help getting a job or other services that ORR offers. They also have told me that they will send you to a juvenile detention center that is not operated by ORR. We were told that if we escape we will be considered a criminal and that the police will come looking for us.
12. When I was at Casa Esperanza, they would take me to church on Sunday. Since I've been here, I have not been allowed to go to church, even though some of the other children have been allowed to go church.
13. Up until today, nobody had explained my rights under the Flores Settlement. Before my meeting today, center staff gave us a folder with documents in English that we did not understand and told us that the purpose for meeting today was to talk about the conditions in the center. They did not explain to us any of the documents or our rights. For instance, Center staff did not tell us that we had a right to reunify with our family without unnecessary delay.
14. Center staff can also be brusque. Many do not say "please" and they yell at us. They also write us up for any little thing when they are in a bad mood. One day, another kid in the facility told a member of the staff, "Next time, say 'please.'" The staff member replied, "shut up."
15. Center staff does not give me enough alone time before bed. I like to read the Bible, write in my diary, but staff only gives us thirty minutes of alone time before bedtime to engage in these kinds of activities.
16. I have asked center staff to give me more alone time—time to be by myself—but it is difficult. One day I did not feel emotionally well. I had just received news from my mother that my aunt had become very sick, and I was feeling lonely, anxious, and worried. I wanted to be alone to process what I was feeling so I asked the center staff that I wanted to go to my room to be alone. The center staff did not let me go to my room, so I started crying out of frustration. After I started crying, I had to speak to a supervisor to be allowed to go to my room accompanied by a staff member. They only allowed me to be in my room for 30 minutes which was not sufficient for my wellbeing. We should not have to get to tears before we are given space.

17. There is no freedom here. I understand that they have to follow a schedule, but they should give us alternatives of things to do, especially for those of us who have been locked up for so long. They are very rigid with the schedule they force us to follow and sometimes we just don't want to participate in the activities that they have for us, but they do not respect that. They do not allow us to pick which activities we would like to participate in or what areas of the facility we would like to spend time at.







7. I stay in a room with a woman and an 8-year old boy. We each have a mattress to sleep on and an aluminum blanket. It is very cold so I wear my blanket all the time. When I first get it it keeps me warm but pretty soon it doesn't anymore. It was the same exactly at the first place.
8. There is a bathroom with a toilet, toilet paper, a sink and soap. The toilet has a short door. I cover myself with my aluminum blanket because there is a camera pointed right at the toilet.

10. I get a burrito, cookie and juice an 7am, 10am, 1pm, 8pm, and 12am. There is a water dispenser with cups in the room where I stay.



5. The temperature here is variable. Some rooms are really cold and others are okay. They give us aluminum blankets which are okay, but they don't cover me completely, so the parts of me that are not covered are cold.
6. The lights are on all the time, but it doesn't really bother me.
7. The agents explained my right to see a judge but didn't give me a written notice of this right. I was not given any notice, written or oral, of my legal rights in this facility. I did not get a list of free legal services. I was able to make a phone call to my family here in the United States, but wasn't advised of any right to call an attorney.
8. I have been here at Tucson CBP for two and one-half days now. I hope to be released to my family in Minnesota.
9. The Border Patrol agent never asked me if I was afraid to return to Guatemala, but they gave me a sheet with pre-printed questions. I don't remember all the questions, but some of them were whether I had left Guatemala because of murderers, and whether someone would hurt me if I returned home, and what family member would receive me here, and whether I came here to work or study?





I, David A [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and complete to the best of my knowledge and recollection:

1. My name is David A [REDACTED] [REDACTED] My date of birth is June 29, 2002. I am 15 years old. I lived with my brother and my grandmother in San Vicente, El Salvador, until my brother and I decided to leave on our own for the United States.
2. My brother's name is Cesar A [REDACTED] [REDACTED] His date of birth is September 28, 2005. He is 12 years old.
3. We left El Salvador together on May 28, 2018. We crossed the river into the United States on June 13, 2018, at about 5:00 pm. After we crossed, we walked about 30 minutes looking for an immigration patrol.

We wanted to turn ourselves in to get protection.

4 When we found an immigration patrol, they had us enter the vehicle and drove us about one hour to another place, not the place we are now. I do not know the name of that place. I know that there were cells with cement floors and cement benches along the walls. When we left the cells for cleaning, I saw that the cells were arranged in a semicircle with a group of immigration officials in the middle looking out over us from behind a group of computers.

5 We stayed in that place about 24 hours. My brother and I were placed in separate cells, next to each other. When I went in, I saw that there were 31 people in my cell, age 13 and up. All of us were under age 18.

6 The lights were on in the cell the whole time. We each had a blanket. There were no mattresses in my cell.

7. We were not able to bathe in that place. We bathed once we reached this place. The first place we were in only had a toilet. It had toilet paper but no soap. We did not have toothbrushes or toothpaste in that cell.

8 There was water to drink in a large receptacle in the cell. There were enough cups for all of us. I drank about three times, but I thought the water was strange because it tasted of chlorine. There was something strange about the way it tasted.

9 Here we are in a place that is twenty minutes or less from the first place. I don't know the name, but it has chain link fencing dividing the sleeping areas. My brother and I are together. We

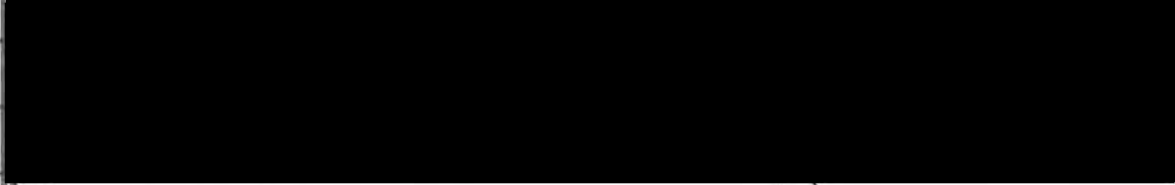
have been here since yesterday evening, so we arrived here on June 14, 2018.



My brother and I were brought here to Ursula on Thursday 06/14/18. It is really hard to keep the days straight because in both places there are no windows and the lights are always on.

Here they treat us okay. The food is still not good but I eat it because I am hungry. At least here there is hot food twice a day.

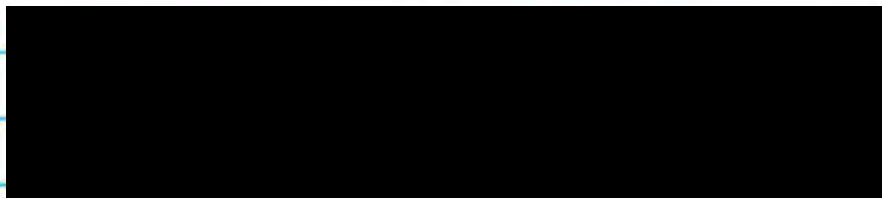

This was all a shock because a year before our lawyer had told us we won our case. My mom even had work authorization and a social security number. We went + bought suitcases + packed. The next day we were deported ~~to~~ to El Salvador. My sister came with us.

We spent 4 months in El Salvador but it was not good. It is dangerous we thought about ~~we were going to~~ opening a shop but the gangs require protection ⁵⁹³ money

And if you don't pay - they are violent. Also we were living in the Zona 18 which is the camp that controls it. The school where we wanted to go was ~~my cousin's family~~ ^{was} in the MS-13 controlled area. I wanted to go to high school w/ my cousin but crossing from one side to the other makes you a target.

Finally my mom tried to take us to Mexico to get Mexican residency because her husband is Mexican -

but she could not do that & they threatened to deport her. That is when we decided to try to get home to the U.S. She sent my U.S. sister

~~My~~ ^{she} got sent to be w/ her dad & in Detroit.

K [redacted] We crossed in Reynosa on a raft. *we stayed in Reynosa. We walked & were caught by border patrol. That was on Monday or Tues 06-11 or 12-2018. They put me in a separate cell from my mom. The next day they were taking me away. One officer stopped just before taking me and said [redacted] not get caught we went to a house. a week later we were put in a trailer and at the checkpoint border patrol caught us.

"Did you get a chance to say goodbye to your mom?" I said I had not spoken to her since we arrived & asked please to see her one last time. He got her and we were able to say goodbye. That was the last time I saw her. ~~She told me~~

Before that there was a lot of confusion about my case because I had been here before. They asked if I wanted to speak to the consul but I did not understand what that would do. ~~Then~~ First the officer told me it was not worth it so I said "OK, No" but then later they said I should check a different box & say I want to talk to a judge. They said that I would be transferred to a shelter & could go be with my grand father.

I have been at Ursula since Tuesday 6-12-18. First they told me that I would go to a shelter with the other girls in my cage. But they took the other girls & not me. It seems now that my mother is coming back here & I will go to family detention with her.

My grandfather is in Detroit (TPS) His number is [REDACTED] ~~they~~ I got to speak to him. They let me have one phone call each day. He said that he is filling out papers for me to go there.

The treatment here is okay but not a good place for a long time. Also there are little kids here who are not being taken care of. There is one little girl who does not speak Spanish only Quiche. - She only cries & there is no one to take care of her ~~of~~ or comfort her.

She responds when guards call her name. But other than that she just cries and asks for her "papi". Only us other girls in the cage take care of her & comfort her.

There is another little girl 2 y.o. - they tell me her name is Bethany. She does not talk. She is in diapers & asks us to change her & to feed her. She is alone. When I arrived there was a girl "Paola" who was taking care of her - but she did not know her. When Paola left I took over because the little girl follows me & asks me for help. One time I was called away & when I came back the little girl was crying & needed a new diaper. No one was helping her. 1. My name is Kevin G. [REDACTED]. My date of birth is [REDACTED] October 26, 2000. I am 17 years old. I lived in La Unión, El Salvador, until I left for the United States on my own, several weeks ago.
2. I entered the United States by crossing the river on ~~Monday~~ ^{Tuesday} ~~morning~~ ^{A.M.} very early in the morning. I understand from the lawyer taking this declaration that today is Friday, June 15, 2018, so I entered on June 12, 2018. After I crossed, I walked until I found an immigration patrol so I could turn myself in.
3. The immigration patrol took me in a car to the hickens right here in

McAllen, Texas, a few blocks from the detention center where I am now.

4. I was in the hielera from the early morning on Tuesday until about 3:00 pm, when immigration transferred me to the detention center where I am now. I don't know the name of it. They tell me I am in a cell in McAllen, Texas, in a large place with a lot of cages where we sleep.

5. In the hielera, I never heard anything about what was happening in my case. The only contact I had with immigration was when they asked me questions or took my fingerprints and took my photo. They didn't give me any information in the hielera.

6. In the place where I am now, somebody told me they will send me to a shelter, and from there maybe I can join my family members.

in the United States, and I will have a hearing with a judge. They gave this information in a group presentation to everybody here on Wednesday. They also gave another group presentation on Thursday for people who had just arrived.

7. I was not able to call my family from the hielera. I was able to call my sister on Wednesday from this place. Before that, I was feeling very bad because I hadn't been able to contact her and tell her where I was.

8. In the hielera, I was placed in a cell with about 10 other boys. Some were my age, but some were younger, like 13 or 14 years old. Sometimes there were more people and sometimes less.

9. I wasn't issued a blanket, and neither was a friend who entered at the same time. We took some

blankets that two boys left behind when they left. There were no mattresses in the cells.

10. There was water for drinking in the cell, in a large plastic Thermos. I drank from it once. It tasted like chlorine, and I didn't like it.
11. The toilet was right there in the cell with us. There was no soap, but I think there was some disinfectant for hands. There was toilet paper.
12. The food in the hielera was a sandwich, a piece and some crackers. I ate twice while I was in the hielera. The truth is it wasn't enough for me. I was hungry in between meals.
13. I was not able to shower in the hielera. I finally showered yesterday, here.



1. My name is Yender E [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] My date of birth is September 9, 2000. I am 17 years old. I grew up in Comapa, Jutiapa, Guatemala, and ~~lived~~ ^{stayed} in the capital of Guatemala just before I left on my own for the United States.

2. I arrived in the United States on June 12, 2018, at about 10:00 or 11:00 pm. I crossed the river and then walked to a road. An immigration patrol came by and saw me and called me over, and had me get in the car. They did not ask me any questions.

3. They took me to the place I am detained now, where I spent 5⁶²⁰ or

10 minutes waiting to be registered. Then they took me to the place we call the hielera, which is about 5 minutes away in a police vehicle. I stayed in the hielera for about 12 hours, after which I was transferred back to this place.

4. I don't know the exact name of this place. It is about 5 minutes from the hielera. I know we are in McAllen, Texas.

5. When I arrived at the hielera, they placed me in a room with other boys. I don't know the exact number, because the officials constantly took people out and brought new ones in. There were boys of about 15 to 17 years of age in the room with me.

6. I was placed in the cell at about 11:00pm. When I entered, I didn't receive a blanket or anything to

eat. I didn't eat until about 5am the next morning, when I received a sandwich and a soft drink. I only ate once while I was in the hielera.

7. While I was in the hielera, I managed to get a blanket from another boy when he left. There were no mattresses in the hielera.

8. I did not take a shower when I was in the hielera. I took a shower the day before yesterday, when I arrived here.

9. The toilet in the hielera is in the cell with us, with a short wall between us and the toilet. There was soap in a dispenser. The toilet had toilet paper.

10. The water was in a plastic container in the room with us. I had one glass while I was there. It had a taste like chlorine.

11. I have spent 50 hours in all in detention. I came to this place at 11:00 am the day before yesterday.

12. While I was in the hielera immigration officials, did not give me any information about what the next steps were in my case. The only thing they did was to ask me what the contact information for my relatives here was. They did not say when they would contact my relatives or when I would be released to them.

13. Here I have been given more information. I received a group presentation that explained a little about the process. They told me when I leave depends on the process. I hear I could be here two or three days more. I heard this from the consular officer of my country. Immigration officials haven't told me this directly.

It was also the consular officer who gave the presentation, not immigration officers.



I, MAURICIO B [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is July 11, 2000. I am 17 years old. I am from Leon Guanajuato, Mexico. I was born in Leon Guanajuato, Mexico.
2. My parents are still in Leon Guanajuato, Mexico. I came here because my grandmother is sick. My cousin [REDACTED] lives in Kansas City, Kansas and I came here to ask him for money to help my grandmother. It took me a day and a half to get to the border and I had no contact with his parents during that time. My parents knew I was coming here. Before I came here I researched about asylum on the internet.
3. I came here by foot to the San Ysidro border crossing. When I got to the border I asked for a passport, but they told me it would take 4-6 weeks. I saw a group of 3 officers and asked them for a green card. I told them I am here for political asylum. They told me to wait there and that he would check my documents.
4. I got to contact my parents this morning at 4am because they were reviewing my case. I had a phone in my backpack when I was detained but it didn't have service. This morning they called my mom from the office and then after a little time I was able to talk to my mom.
5. When they were checking docs they took me to a separate place and said, "I don't think we can help you." Then they said, "Yes, we are going to help." They took me into a big room with other people being questioned. I came here with my birth certificate, my mom's proof of voting with him and he talked to two officers and they were nice but the third officer – female – objected. She would just laugh. They took me to a room where there were sinks and diapers. They asked me to empty my pockets and then to take my shoelaces off. My jacket had a hoodie and they cut the metal grommets out of it. They put gloves on, and then they had me stand with my legs and feet apart and touched him, and then they took my shoes off and they took apart the soles of the shoes.
6. Then I passed into another room. There were some handcuffs but they didn't put them on me, they were just there in front of me. They took my fingerprints and I think they took a photo of me. Then a woman walked in and she thought. I didn't understand English so she said they had a kid there that was trying to play games with them and she said that now he looks like he didn't know what was going on but she said she would play a game on him. I thought maybe I was going to be deported, but two guys walked me to the place before the jails. The guy took my documents asked what he intended to do here and I said I was asking for asylum and I wanted to learn English. So on the paperwork they just wrote that I came here to learn English so I think that's why they were laughing. Then I was asked to stand in front of a wall and read it, and the wall listed different diseases (i.e. Zika). I went into a room where there were 3 separate cubbies. I saw a woman in cubby 3 crying and she had a blanket on. I was still thinking they might let me pass, I did not want to spend the night. They told me to walk forward and grab a cot and a blanket. And I asked, "Why am I here? I haven't done anything wrong." They were laughing at me. I asked how long I am going to be here and the officer said, "A very very long time." They treated me like a criminal.

7. I then went into a room where there were like 10 kids sleeping on the floor. It's like a jail. In the room there are kids that have been there for days so it smells really bad. There is no ventilation except the AC. The walls have a ton of graffiti. No privacy, in the corner there is a toilet with only two walls and it's about to fall apart. You have no privacy, everyone can see. None of the kids there want to use the restroom because of it. I felt like I was in shock, the officer said, "Move! I'm not going to wait for you all day." The room is about 6x6 meters. In the room, I was first very reluctant to talk to anyone, but the kids started talking to me, from all different parts of the world, one African kid, and then they checked to see if I spoke English. Of all of them, I think only 2 crossed illegally and the rest came here asking for asylum. The kids range from 12-17 year olds. I was very scared, I thought I would break into tears. After I started to relax, I started helping a Russian kid because he was having a really hard time. The kids all feel like, "Why are they treating us this way? We don't even know if it's day or night. One window into a hallway and some of the rooms have a tv. No window into the outside. My room does not have a tv. One container with water that you pump for water and you have paper cups. Some of the rooms have 30 kids and those rooms are only a little bigger than his room. They compare amongst other kids. I have the aluminum thermal blankets which are nicer than the blankets in the rooms with televisions. They never turn off the AC and he's very cold at night. Won't give him any extra blankets.
8. At 6am they wake us up, and we have a choice between burritos or cereal and milk. Sometimes the kitchen is so packed you have to stand and eat. Around 10:50am is lunch. Chicken nuggets or hamburgers, and a juice boxes. Then at 4pm, it's the same food. Dinner is at midnight Chicken nuggets or hamburgers, and a juice boxes. Again, so the last 3 meals are the same. One day there was a different meal for lunch, it was vegetables or a sandwich. Generally I'm sleepy and tired so I don't have an appetite. No snacks in between meals.
9. So cold, two of the kids their feet hurt because it's so cold in there. No clothes given to them. They don't wash their clothes.
10. Once, the day after he came in, they gave him a small stick with mint on the end to brush his teeth, so they do not have toothbrushes. The first day I came they asked if I wanted to shower and I said no because I thought they would let me leave. Only 3 of the kids in his room had said yes. But I have not been allowed to shower since then.
11. There were 11 kids when I first arrived, but 3 have been removed. There was a 13 year old that always wanted attention so they created a game with a blanket that smelled terrible. But then the 13 year old said that someone hit him. So that 13 year old kid was removed.
12. The lights are on all the time. There's a big camera in the corner so I think it's because they want to keep the lights on for the camera feed.
13. I came here on Monday. My parents didn't know until yesterday where I was.
14. In the kitchens, there are children and adults. 12 and above, they are separate, but 11 and below are with their mothers. In the same hallway, there are children's cells and adult's cells. But you can't really hear through the walls. The adults are in cells with mixed gender. Families with little kids are only held for 3 days.
15. I have no pillow. The cot is made from a tarp material with only a little bit of stuffing. I am sore, it is very hard to sleep on.
16. Cousin [REDACTED] lives in Kansas City. They called my cousin this morning at 4am but the cousin thought the officer was joking. They asked the cousin to come pick him up. They wouldn't let the cousin talk to me directly.

17. They don't give me books or games or anything. We feel like we're going crazy.
18. An officer gave me a piece of paper that spelled out his rights in Spanish. But the paper was for people that are here illegally. I didn't understand why because I came legally.
19. I feel my rights have been violated. I don't care if I go into the United States or Mexico now, I just want this to be over.
20. We were so happy to see the light to come to this interview.

I, OWEN E [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is October 3, 2000. I am 17 years old. I am from Guastatoya, El Progreso, Guatemala.
2. I left Guatemala because my life and the lives of my family are at risk there. I came with my two brothers and my mom. We are all here at San Ysidro. My brother who is 14 years old, [REDACTED] [REDACTED] is in the room with me and my other brother is 6 years old, [REDACTED] and he is with my mom, [REDACTED]
3. Yesterday we arrived at the border around 1pm. We came directly to the gate at San Ysidro and presented ourselves. We came on a bus from Guatemala, it took us about one week to get to the border. The officers took us to register. They asked us for information and then they brought us here. We came with Guatemalan passports. My mom told the officers that we are here looking for political asylum. She brought evidence that our lives are at risk in Guatemala. She brought photo images from the Public Ministry of Guatemala. It was a signed declaration from the agency that their lives were in danger in Guatemala. The officer sent people and shot into our house with guns. My father works in the municipality and he didn't like how business was run in the municipality. My father saw a lot of corruption, so he started criticizing the municipality through social media, and once he did the officers coordinated the attack on his family's house to kill them. But at this time, his father was already in the United States. The attack happened at 5am and my brother, mother, and I were all home. After that incident my father asked someone to put cameras all around our house. We didn't feel safe. My mother would take us to school and pick us up. We couldn't live at peace.
4. My father, [REDACTED] is in either Oakland, California or Los Angeles, California. We last spoke to my father 4 days ago. My father moved to the US one year ago. He came illegally to the US. In Oakland, my father was the victim of a shootout. The police then helped my father apply for a green card, that is still being processed. Since we've been here, we haven't asked about using the phone to call him. We have not received any information about our rights or how long we are going to be here.
5. My uncle [REDACTED] my aunt [REDACTED] and my grandmother [REDACTED] are also here in the US. My father and uncle live together in Oakland, CA. My grandmother and aunt live in Los Angeles, CA. None of these 3 have residency here. My uncle has been here for over 10 years. My grandmother and aunt have been here about 30 years.
6. Right now there are 9 of us in one room but there used to be 12. They did not give me a pillow, just a blanket and a mat. The mat is a thick cotton material with a sponge inside. The blanket is thick cotton. I got the blanket and mat just before I entered the room. The bathroom is in the room and is not private. There is one sink. I have not seen any soap. They have not given me any dental, hair, or body hygiene products. I have not taken a shower and they have not offered me one. We have one window in the room that faces the hallway and we do not have television. The lights are always fully on, 24/7. The AC is always running, it's very cold.
7. We do not have a television or a clock. We don't know what time it is inside. No books or games in the room.

8. I had a hamburger and juice for dinner last night. It was just the kids from my room at the cafeteria for dinner last night, so I don't know if my mother and brother got dinner. This morning I had a burrito for breakfast. For lunch today I had a torta with some type of white ham, some carrots, some animal shaped cookies, and a fruit juice. It tasted alright. There are no snacks between meals. There is no soap in the room, but they have hand sanitizer at the cafeteria. We have a 5-gallon water dispenser in the room that we pump for water. It's about half full and I don't know how often they replenish it.
9. The room is all male. I am in the room with my 14 year old brother [REDACTED] and the rest of the boys range between 14 and 16.
10. I do not know why they separated my mom, [REDACTED] from me and [REDACTED]. I saw my mom today at the cafeteria when we were getting breakfast and lunch. That was a surprise. Apart from that, I was not able to see my mom. I don't know where in the facility my mom and brother are being kept. There are other children in his room who have also been separated from their moms.
11. If we are allowed to stay in the US, we will go to Oakland. My brothers and I plan to go to school and my mother will wait for her permission to work.

I, ALEXANDER T [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. I am nine (9) years old and I was born in Lazaro, Cardenas, Mexico.
2. My mom and I left Mexico because we were scared. My mom and dad are divorced and sometimes my dad would hit me and my mom. He would leave bruises and marks and hurt my mom very bad. Other bad things happened to my mom too. My mom and I got on a plane with my aunt and cousin in Michoacán and flew to Tijuana. My mom and I stayed in Tijuana for a few days with one of my mom's friends.
3. My mom, aunt, cousin and I presented ourselves at the border one or two days ago. I believe that it was on or about July 4, 2018. We were taken to San Ysidro. The facility is clean. Sometimes the officers yell at us if we don't understand or don't follow the directions. No one is telling us what will happen next. We don't know how long we will be here. I am scared because I feel like something bad is happening and sometimes I feel upset. I don't know if someone might do something to me or my mom.
4. When we got to the facility in San Ysidro, I was given a sandwich, cookies, carrots and juice. My mom and I were put in a group and the officers took us to the room where they slept. After some time, we were given chicken nuggets for lunch. Later that day, we were given dinner but I was very tired and don't remember what we had. The next morning, the officers gave my mom a burrito for breakfast and I got cereal and milk. Even if I am hungry, no one gives me snacks. I am hungry, but I have to wait until a meal time. There is a gallon of water in the room with paper cone cups for all of the women and children.
5. My mom and I are staying in a room with many other mothers and children. We sleep next to each other on mattresses that are the floor, we each have a blanket. At night time, it can get very hot in the room where we are staying. In the mornings, it is very cold. There is a bathroom in the room where we are staying, a wall separates the bathroom from the sleeping area. There is no soap in the bathroom, and there are no showers.
6. My mom and I have not taken a shower since we got here. No one has asked us if we want to take a shower.
7. My mom has a cell phone but they won't let us use it. I don't think anyone has let us use a phone.
8. My mom and I have been in San Ysidro for about 2 days. My mom is planning to work after we leave here.

I, KIMBERLY V [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is January 4, 2008. I am ten (10) years old. I am from Lazaro Cardenas, Michoacán in Mexico.
2. My mom sister and I left Mexico because we are scared. My father disappeared in 2017, I don't know what happened to him. Since then, bad people tried to break into our house twice. A friend of my neighbor always says nasty things to my mom and wants to be her boyfriend, but my mother never wants to talk to him. In February 2018, the neighbor's friend tried to break into our house. I saw him try to open our door. I told my mom and she saw him, then he drove away. In June 2018, another man tried to break into our house. Our neighbor saw him in the bushes near our house, and called my mom to warn her. Then the man ran away. My mom called the police and the neighbor gave the police a description of the man. The police never caught him. I am afraid to go back to our house in Michoacán because someone might break in and hurt us. The neighborhood is very dark and there are a lot of shootings. My uncle called my mom and told him that someone was killed in our neighborhood right after we left. I don't want to go back to Michoacán because I am afraid that my sister, mom and I might get hurt.
3. My mom, sister and I presented ourselves at the border about two days. I believe that it was on or about July 4, 2018 around 8:00AM. We were taken directly to the San Ysidro Pedestrian West Facility. When we arrived, we waited for a long time in a waiting room. Then, the officers moved us to another room where there were a lot of women and children. My mom, sister and I were only given two blankets that all three of us share. We sleep with a lot of other women and children on cushions on the floor. Every day they bring more people in to the room. It is very crowded.
4. I am very hungry all of the time. The guards wake us up around 5:00AM for breakfast, I know that it is early because I can see a clock in the cafeteria. They give us cereal, cookies, juice and veggies for breakfast. We each lunch in the afternoon. We can have either a sandwich or a burrito. I don't eat lunch because the sandwiches and the burritos are cold. They don't taste good. Later on, we can have either chicken nuggets with ketchup or a cheeseburger. We also get a juice, cookies and vegetables. Late at night, around 10:00PM or 11:00PM, we can have chicken nuggets with ketchup or a cheeseburger with juice, cookies and vegetables. I am very hungry between meals, but there are no snacks. We are not allowed to have any food in the rooms.
5. The room where we sleep is very cold. The air conditioning is always on, but it is even colder at night. Everyone in the room complains about how cold it is. The cafeteria is cold too. I usually eat standing up because the metal bench is too cold to sit on. Since there are no doors on the restroom, sometimes the room smells bad.

6. There are six bright lights in the room where we sleep. At night time, the guards turn off four of the lights, but it is still very bright in the room. I have trouble sleeping because the lights are always on. There is a television outside of the room, we can see it through the window. There are always cartoons on the television, but we can't hear them.

7. No one has talked to me about my rights since I have been here.

8. My mom, sister and I have been at the San Ysidro Pedestrian West Facility for about two (2) days. We are planning to go to Washington to stay with my Aunt [REDACTED]

I, MICHELLE T [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is July 9, 2001. I am 16 years old. I am from Iguala, Guerrero, Mexico.
2. I was born in Mexico and then my father, who is from the US, came to Mexico and adopted me. Then when I was a few months old, my father brought me illegally into the US without any paperwork. I was lived in the US until I was 7 years old, but I was undocumented. My father brought me back to Mexico because he wanted to do things legally. But he worked in the US as a truck driver so he had to stay in the US, so for the last 10 years I have been living with my father's mother in Mexico.
3. Yesterday my father and I came to the Mesa De Otai gate at 4pm and presented ourselves. We showed them our passports. My father has a US passport and I have a Mexican passport. They handcuffed and arrested us. They then separated us, we were still in the same room, but we were physically separated. The officers removed my handcuffs. I asked if I could sit next to my dad because I was afraid, but they said no. They offered me food and made me sign a receipt saying that I had received food. The meal was a sandwich (I do not know what kind of meat was in it), carrots, animal crackers, and juice. They told us they would come back in 30 minutes, but it was about 6 hours before they came back. When they came back they handcuffed me again and led us to a van. The van took me into this building and then my father and I were physically separated into different cubicles in a security room. While we were in this security room they brought us a meal at 3am.
4. At 4am they took me to a different room to sleep. I slept for 1 hour, then they woke me up at 5am to go eat breakfast. I ate Lucky Charms.
5. They then told me that they were going to release my father so I asked to see my father and they let me talk to him for a little bit. Then they told me that because they can't verify that he is my father, they will keep me in this detention center for a few days until ICE picks me up. Then they said ICE will put me in a house/foster home. My father left the facility today and went back to Victorville, California.
6. I am now in limbo, they won't let me go back to Mexico and they won't let me be free here.
7. The officers have been screaming at me today. I didn't know where the kitchen area was and they screamed at me that I was going the wrong way. I was walking with a woman with a small baby and trying to help her find diapers and they yelled at us.
8. I am staying in a room with 30 people. The room is filled with only women and children of all ages. The room is rectangular and about 20 feet by 25 feet. I have one thick cotton blanket and a mat that is on the floor. There is one bathroom in the room but I haven't used it because it is not private and I do not feel comfortable using it. I haven't noticed if there is a sink. The toilet does flush. I haven't seen any dental hygiene products or feminine products. They have not offered me a shower.
9. I asked for asylum because my grandmother started being extorted for money to keep me alive. I don't know who is extorting her but there is a lot of delinquency in the town and that's what they do. We did not report this to the police in Iguala because the men extorting us told us not to talk to the police. When we crossed we told the officers about everything going on in Iguala and that we were seeking asylum. But then the officers asked my dad, "Why didn't you just take her to another state in Mexico?"

I felt like I had to defend my father so I said, "He did take me to another state. He took me to Toluca, Mexico. But the extortion calls to my grandmother continued." I have been interviewed in this facility several times and I have told each person I am seeking asylum.


10. There are no windows to the outside in my room. I never know what time it is. The AC is on all of the time. The room is too cold. There is one television, but it is on the other side of the window that looks into the hallway. You can't hear it, you can only see it. It only plays the Disney channel. I have not had water, I did not notice if there is water in my room. When we were waiting in different security rooms, my father asked for water and they always gave him juice instead. I have only slept one hour since yesterday. I can't shower, I can't change my clothes, I don't have any access to face creams or hygiene products. I feel dirty. I feel tired. I have a stomach ache.
11. The officers moving us from place to place are rude and rough. There is a woman in my room that sounds like she is sick.
12. I do not like being here. At this point I'd rather go back to Mexico and be with my grandma and my aunt than be in a foster home for a month or longer. Plus I will be in detention for my birthday because it is on July 9th.



5. There are 63 people, a lot of people, in our room. There is no place for us to run and play because there is not enough space in the room. They never let me outside to play. I have not asked to go play outside, but I feel like I cannot ask. I like to run. My favorite sport is soccer, but I can't play soccer here. We don't have any games or books here.
6. We are going to see my mom's aunt [REDACTED] in San Antonio, Texas. They have not let us use the telephone to call [REDACTED]
7. I have not seen my suitcase since yesterday. It is hard to walk without my shoelaces on my shoes. We take our shoes off when we're playing because it's too hard to keep them on.
8. I was tired when they woke us up for breakfast this morning. Everyone has to wake up when they come get us for breakfast. The officers said I am not allowed to stay in bed and skip breakfast.

I, VANESSA R [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is December 7, 2004. I am 13 years old. I am from Uruapan, Michoacan, Mexico.
2. We crossed yesterday at 2:30PM in the afternoon. I crossed with my mom and siblings. My mom's name is [REDACTED] My siblings' names are [REDACTED]
3. We left Uruapan because there is a lot of violence there. About two months ago, four men came to our house with masks on just after my father arrived home from work. Three men came into our house and one stayed in the car. My mother, siblings, and I all ran and hid. Then they took my father and left. My father disappeared and we have no idea where he is. The day after they took my father, the people that took him called us and threatened us to not go to the police and they told us that they would not bring him back. They told us to leave town or they would kill us, too.
4. Then soon after, where I go to school, some masked men came and took 10 ninth grade girls from my school. The masks covered everything but their eyes. I was in the restroom next door to the classroom they went into so I was very scared. This happened about two months ago and I don't know if the girls were ever found. In the past they have been waiting for the girls right outside of my school, girls used to get kidnapped outside walking to and from school, but now they've started coming into the classrooms. The girls that get kidnapped never come back. Because of my father's kidnapping and the fact that I was going to start ninth grade in September, my mom said we can't stay anymore.
5. We came from Uruapan asking for rides and it took us a month and a half to get here. We were coming here with our neighbors hitchhiking from Uruapan. We arrived at the border at Chapparal. It's the new gate in Tijuana. We waited for three weeks with a lot of people there. We took a number and waited to be called to apply for asylum. We checked every three days to see how close we were to our number being called. The list of numbers was organized by a group called Beta. When our number was called, Beta walked 20 of us over a bridge that was very crowded with people. From there, the US officers walked us to a place that looked like a warehouse where they took information from my mom. My mom wanted to tell them about all of the violence in Uruapan, but they only let my mother say three words, so she said, "Insecurity, and they took away my children's father." We only had our birth certificates and showed them to the officers. Then from that place they took us to another place that is closer to the front, and there they took our photo, fingerprints, and then gave us food. The meal was chicken nuggets and juice. They separated my neighbors at this point. My neighbor's two older sons and husband were separated from her. Then the two sons, the husband, the mother and youngest daughter, and my family were separated into four separate rooms. It was about 10:00PM by the time I arrived at my room. They gave each of us a blanket. The mats were already on the floor. The room was very very crowded. They did not offer us dinner.
6. This morning I had cereal with milk and juice for breakfast. For lunch I had a sandwich with cut up carrots and celery, and a juice box. It was enough food.
7. I was cold last night even though I had a blanket. The AC is on all day. I slept alone, my mom was with the kids. Because the lights are dimmed, but never turned off, and they come through the night to call people, I only slept a little bit last night. I did not have a pillow. We just use a sweater or a blanket.


8. They gave us three little sticks with a sponge to clean our teeth, one for each person except my 2 year old sister. There is a little window you can knock on in the room for more things. We have a flush toilet in our room and toilet paper. I have used the restroom in our room. There is only one wall for the restroom and it is not private. There is a sink in our room, but there is no soap. We have a water dispenser in our room that provides room temperature water. We have paper cups to use. They have not offered us showers.
9. There are only women and children in our room. The children are all ages.
10. The women with babies try very hard to make sure their kids don't pee their pants. But when it does happen, they knock on the door to get a guard's attention to ask for clothes from their suitcase. But it's very hard to get the guard's attention. She saw one woman wait for ten minutes.
11. We have not had access to our suitcases and belongings since we've been here.
12. I have not made friends with any of the other kids in the room, I just stay with my siblings. There is a television in the room but the programs are not for kids. They always play football.
13. There are three windows in the room. There is a little window in the door. There is a window out to the hallway that faces the TV. There is a third small window into the hallway, it's about three feet tall, but all but 5 inches of it are covered up.
14. We track the time by when they take us to eat. There is no clock in the room. And they took everyone's watches and jewelry. They took my hairband and my shoelaces and my earrings. We tore off part of the metal blanket to tie my hair up in a ponytail.
15. I am very tired and sleepy. I am happy that I am with my mom. I think they separated the sons from my neighbors because their sons are older than me.
16. No one has read my legal rights to me. In the first place where we were interviewed, I believe they gave my mom a paper that said our rights, they put it into the folder, they gave her the folder to take to the second place where they took our photo and fingerprints. At that place they took the folder away from her so my mom never had an opportunity to read it.
17. They took my cell phone away and they have not let my mom use the telephone. My brother's godmother lives here in the US.

There was a man whose father and son were killed. My uncle told me that he saw the men being killed. There are daily shootings in my home. A man named [REDACTED] is the one that shoots people daily. My mom and I left La Batea on a bus and went to an airport. We took a plane from there to Tijuana. We waited in Tijuana for between fifteen and seventeen days before it was our turn to present ourselves at the border.
3. We presented ourselves at the border about the afternoon time. I believe that it was on or about 07/04/2018. We came to a long, winding line and my mom was given a number. I have been ok here with my mom. The room is sometimes clean and sometimes dirty. In the room that I am at sometimes a boy brings trash from the place we eat. In the room there are also wet baby wipes and lots of paper towels. The room smells sometimes because of the bathroom because it is in the same room were we sleep and spend the day.
4. I eat 3 times a day, breakfast, lunch and dinner. I have been given burritos with eggs, beans and ham. I have been given little pieces of chicken with cheese. I also have been given fruit juice. I have been given cereal in a round container. I generally like the food, but I am always hungry between breakfast and lunch, but there are no snacks. When it is time to eat, my mom always gets two burritos or sandwiches, but I only take one because I don't want to get in trouble.
5. The temperature in the room is cold more at night. During the day I don't feel anything. I cover myself with my blanket at night. My mom has one blanket and I have my own. I sleep in a soft red mat/cushion. I do not have a pillow.
6. The lights in the room are similar to the ones in this room. The lights are strong/ bright. I don't really pay attention to the lights because I am just playing. I was given a little stick with a blue square to brush my teeth. I was not given toothpaste. I thought it was a candy when I got it, but it is for my teeth. I haven't been asked to take a shower since I arrived. My clothes are in the suitcase but not in the room. The bathroom is in the room and it only has a small wall metal divider but it doesn't have a door. There is a sink in the bathroom but there is not soap to wash my hands.

7. Since I have been here, no one told me anything about my rights or about calling a lawyer. My mom talked to my uncle when we arrived, I have not talked to anyone.
8. My mom and I have been at the San Ysidro Pedestrian Facility for about 2 days. If we get to leave here, we want to live in the United States. My uncle lives in the United States already, but I am not sure where.
9. No one has told me when I will get to leave this facility. I am afraid to go back to Michoacán because I don't want to me or my mom to get hurt.



I, LEXYER B [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. I am 17 years old. My date of birth is March 3, 2001. My cousin's name is [REDACTED] [REDACTED] and I were raised as sisters. She is 9 and she was years old and was born on June 18, 2009. We are from small village in Honduras called Lomas de Peniel.
2. In Honduras, my cousin and I lived with my grandmother and my aunt. My mother was raped by drug dealers when she was nineteen (19). I was born as a product of that rape. My mother left Honduras and came to the United States when I was five (5) days old to save me and my grandmother from embarrassment and shame. She believed coming to the United States would to give me a better future. Unfortunately, she was caught by the Zetas, a drug cartel in Mexico, and was raped again while trying to escape. I didn't hear from my mother very much after that, but I knew that she made it to the United States. She lives in Alabama now.
3. The small town where I am from is surrounded by hills and a forest, there are only about fifteen (15) or sixteen (16) homes in the town. Many drug dealers live in the hills. In October 2017, my grandmother and aunt told [REDACTED] and I that we had to leave Honduras. Five (5) days later, my grandmother told me that drug dealers told her that I was old enough to be used as a woman and that they would take me like they took my mother. My grandmother feared for our safety, so we had to leave. I was scared too because the drug dealers had beaten my uncle [REDACTED] father, when he refused to work with them. My uncle was covered in blood and was hurt badly, he fled to Mexico after he was beaten.
4. We took a bus from Honduras to Guatemala in October 2017. We stayed in Guatemala for five (5) months cleaning houses and saving money for two months. During that five months we moved slowly through Guatemala towards Mexico. Sometimes we walked, sometimes we took a bus. When we got to the Mexican border, we paid someone to take us to Mexico on a boat. Once in Mexico, we cleaned houses to save money. Some of the families that we cleaned for let us stay in their houses. When we had enough money, truck driver took us Tijuana, Mexico. We were in Tijuana for two (2) months before our number was called and we were allowed to present ourselves at the border.
5. We presented ourselves at the border about one (1) day ago on July 5, 2018 around 12:00PM. We were taken to San Ysidro. The guards took our fingerprints and photos and made us wait. Then the guards called us into a conference room and asked me my name and asked me why I was here. I told them that I was here to see my mother and the guard asked me why I would come here to live with someone I had never met. Then, the guards took us to a room full of other women and children. We were given thin cushions and blankets, and were told to sleep on the floor.
6. Shortly after we arrived, we were given juice, a sandwich and vegetables. We ate again in the evening around 6:00PM, we were given chicken nuggets, crackers and juice. The food was cold and hard. I fell

asleep after dinner and I don't know if they offered us food again that night. In the morning, we were given cereal, milk and juice. My cousin doesn't like cereal, so she only had juice. We were told that we will eat every six hours.

7. There are about fifty (50) to sixty (60) people in the room where I am staying. The room is very crowded and very cold. When the kids in the room make a lot of noise, the guards turn down the temperature to make it even colder. The room is cleaned once a day.
8. There are three toilets and two sinks in the room. The sleeping area and the restroom are separated by a thin metal wall. There is no soap in restroom. I want to take a shower, but no one has asked me if I want to take a shower yet. I met women who have gone three days without a shower, she said the guards told her that she could not take a shower.. No one has told me when I will be able to take a shower.
9. I am very worried about my grandmother. She is seventy (70) years old. My grandmother has heart problems and high pressure, she was prescribed medication in Mexico. My grandmother brought her medication, but the guards took it when we arrived. She has to ask the guards every twelve hours to bring her medication. My grandmother's condition is getting worse, she cannot move her left arm.
10. Since I have been here, no one has talked to me about my rights or my cousin's rights. The official who interviewed me when I got here told me that I will have to go in front of a judge. He also told me that I have a right to an attorney and he asked me to sign a paper. The form was in Spanish and it said that I had a right to an attorney and I right to call my mom in the United States. An official called my mom yesterday, I could hear my mother telling the official that she didn't understand everything that he was saying. I don't know if I have any other rights here.
11. No one has told me when I will get to see my mom or when I will leave here. I am nervous here because no one is telling me what will happen next, but I am more scared to go back to Honduras.

I, ALAN C [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is February 1, 2005. I am thirteen. I came here with my mother and my brother. My mother's name is [REDACTED] and my brother's name is [REDACTED]. My mom is thirty five years old. My brother is ten months. We came here from Michoacán, Mexico.
2. I don't know why we left Mexico, but we left because my mom told me we had problems and had to leave.
3. We got to this facility by bus, and have only been in this facility. We are requesting asylum. We presented ourselves to an agent. My mom said that we have problems and cannot live in Mexico. What I know personally is that my father mistreated all of us. He beat us, my mother, and me. He hit me with a belt. He hit my mom with his fist. I feel safe now that I have escaped him and am in the United States.
4. We presented ourselves at the border on Wednesday. I don't know what the date was. We got here in the morning. They checked us, took our luggage, and asked for our basic information. They searched us, and we have been kept in what I think is a jail ever since. They took our fingerprints and a picture. It took five hours to process us. Then they took us to separate rooms. My mom went into one room with my brother.
5. I went into a separate room. They were nine other boys there already. The room was small. It is exactly 10 paces by 11 paces, by my footsteps. The other boys are from 12-18 years old, I am the youngest. The other boys told me their age. The older boys are much bigger than me. We share one bathroom with no door. The bathroom has a camera on the ceiling from a corner, and I think it can see me in the other. We take turns using the bathroom. But we are afraid to use the bathroom and try not to use it. We all hold it. I have only been to the bathroom twice but I wait until everyone is asleep, because it doesn't feel private and I am afraid someone will come in while I am using it. So I have only used it twice in 2 days. The officers do not watch over us. They do not ever come in to ask if we are okay or if we need anything.
6. In the three days I have been here, I was only given one mini-sponge on a stick to brush my teeth. I have not used it because one of the other boys used it, and said something was very strange about it, and he didn't like it, so I don't trust it. None of the other boys used.

7. They keep us in a room behind a locked door. I am not allowed to leave. They only bring us outside at mealtimes. There is a window where we can see the officers inside, but there is no sunlight getting to where we are. There is no television, no books, we are very bored. We try to speak to each other to keep busy. There is no room to exercise. No room to play games. We have no chairs. All we have to do all day is to sit on the floor or stand up. There is nothing else.
8. The room is cold enough that most of the time I wear my thick jacket. We are given a mat to sleep on that is six centimeters thick. The floor beneath is cold and hard. It is uncomfortable to sleep because the mat gets very cold and we are all crowded. I cannot stretch my arms out when I sleep. Sometimes when we sleep, the room is so small that our bodies touch. I am given a bed sheet to cover my body.
9. I cannot tell on my own if it is night or day, the only way we know is if we ask the officers.
10. There always is at least one light kept on, it is never dark in the room, not even for sleeping.
11. The room is cleaned once or twice a day. The bathroom does not have soap and no paper towels. There is only toilet paper. We have not been offered a shower since I got here. I have not been offered other clothes. The other children are all wearing the same clothes.
12. I feel bad because I can't be with my mom and my brother. I don't know what is going to happen to us. I feel bad to be locked in the room. I have never been separated from my mother. I have never been separated from my brother before. I used to help take care of my brother. I am worried about my mom and brother, about how they are treated and where.
13. I have seen my mom and my brother when we eat. The only hot food we get is the burrito, but I don't eat it because I don't like it. I only eat juice and crackers. The sandwich is cold, and I didn't like it, but I ate it because it is better than the burrito. It has a slice of bread, one slice of ham, and another slice of bread. There is nothing on the bread, it is very dry. We are taken to eat four times per day. At six is the earliest, the latest is midnight. We have to go to the café when we are told, whether or not we are hungry. I can't eat at six in the morning. I eat at noon, six pm and midnight. I feel hungry in the morning because I missed the six am.

14. What is very difficult here is holding up to go to the bathroom. It is very uncomfortable.
15. No one has told me about my legal rights. I have not seen any information about legal services available to me. I have become aware from others that we are not allowed to use the phone, and no one has provided me access. I have one aunt in the United States, she is a citizen, her name is [REDACTED] and she lives in California. If I could, of course I would like to be released to my aunt. No one has asked me if there is an adult in the U.S. that I could go live with. No one has interviewed me about why I left Mexico. I think my mom did because she told me she did.
16. I have been given no written information about anything. I was given no instructions about anything.
17. I have no idea about the status of my case.

I, JUAN A [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is September 19, 2004. I am 13 years old. I am from Mexico.
2. Describe Reason for leaving country of origin.

I arrived with my mother, my stepfather, my brother and my sister. We left because of the violence in Mexico. 12 years ago, my father was taken and we haven't seen him since. Three months ago, they took my uncle. My mother has lost 3 uncles. I believe that they threatened my mother and that she couldn't report the disappearance to the police. Immediately after my uncle was taken, we fled. We hitchhiked to Tijuana to cross the border. It took about three months to get to the border.

I am afraid that I or a member of my family will be killed if we return.

3. We presented ourselves at the border at about 1 pm in the afternoon on July 5, 2018. We were taken to the San Ysidro Pedestrian West Detention Center.
4. I arrived around 1 to 2 in the afternoon. My first meal was at 7 pm and I received hot chicken nuggets and juice. The second meal was at approximately 11 pm and it was chicken sandwich with yellow cheese. The sandwich was room temperature. It was served with juice. I was given the option to have a second sandwich and I did. This morning for breakfast I was given a choice between a burrito and a sandwich. It seems to be a cheese sandwich but I wasn't sure even though I ate it. It was served with carrots and juice. I am able to eat with my mother, my brother and my younger sister.
5. I have seen my step father in passing.
6. I have one mat to sleep on that is around 3 to 4 inches thick. I also have one blanket. I have not asked for more than one because yesterday there was a person with two mats and they took one of the mats away from him.
7. I am in a room with boys that are 16 and 17, including my older brother who is 16. I am the youngest person in the room. There were 12 people when I first arrived and there are 5 today. When there were 12 people, there was enough room to put all of our mats on the floor at the same time to sleep but we were very close together.
8. There is one toilet in the room that I am staying in. It is in the corner of the room and there are half walls and there is no door. People in the room can see into the toilet. There is a sink. It is above the toilet and cannot be used when someone is using the toilet. There is no soap and there are no paper towels. I have not gotten a toothbrush or toothpaste.
9. I have not been given a chance to shower. There has been no chance to wash my clothes and I haven't been allowed to change into clean clothes that I have brought

10. There is a jug of water in the room but we have not been drinking it because we ran out of paper cups yesterday. They haven't asked for more cups because we think that they will replace them when the room is cleaned.
11. No one has needed medical attention since I arrived but it is hard to get the attention of the staff. We have called to them to ask the time of day and they have not responded. They may not hear us but I do not know.
12. The temperature in my room is a little cold. But I am comfortable because I am wearing a sweatshirt.
13. There are two lights in the room. Both of the lights are on during the day and one of them is turned off during the evening. There is a light on all of the time. I have to cover my head with my blanket to sleep but I am able to sleep if I cover my head.
14. I do not think that my mother was given any information about my legal rights when we arrived. I have not been given any information about my legal rights since I arrived. There is no information posted in the facility that I can see that describes my legal rights.
15. My family is trying to reach my aunt in California. She is a U.S. citizen. We told her that we were coming before we left Mexico but I do not know that we have been able to contact her. I have not seen a telephone that I have access to.
16. The door is locked and I am not free to leave.

I, Edwin Q [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is July 15, 2000. I am seventeen years old. I am from El Salvador.
2. I left El Salvador because gang members from MS-13 were threatening me. When I would try to go to school, members of the gang would threaten me if I did not give them money. I was supposed to go to middle school but I was afraid to go. Two years ago, an acquaintance who was going to the same middle school was beaten to death on the road from my town to the school so I was afraid to go to the school. If I return to El Salvador, I am afraid that the gang members in my area will believe that I was in the territory of a different gang and will harm me.

I am afraid to return to El Salvador and I have told an officer in the facility that I am afraid to return. I have not been asked for any other information.

3. I presented myself at the border about 7 pm on July 3, 2018. I was taken to the San Ysidro Detention Center.
4. We are fed four times a day at this facility. At six in the morning, we receive a choice of a cold bean and egg burrito or cornflakes with milk. At noon, we are given a sandwich with one piece of meat between two slices of bread. I do not know what kind of meat it is and it is often frozen. At six in the evening, we are given a hamburger – it is just a bun and a patty and the hamburger is usually warm but not hot. At midnight, we are given another hamburger. Every meal comes with juice and a small bag of baby carrots. The food is not much and I am often hungry.

I have access to water in a jug in the room that I am kept – there is plenty of water. There are paper cups to drink the water.

5. It is very cold in the room that I am kept. It feels like the air conditioning is always on. I always have my blanket on because I am always cold. The other people in the room with me are also cold. I do not want to tell anyone that I am too cold.
6. The room that I am staying in is cleaned every other day and is clean. The lights are on all of the time. We are provided with a mat that is three to four inches thick to sleep on and a blanket. The mattress is not comfortable but I am able to sleep from time to time. There have been seven to twelve people total in the room including me and they appear to be around my age. We are able to all put our mats down and sleep. The floor is concrete. The door is locked and we are not free to leave.
7. There is a bathroom with a sink in the room. There is one toilet. There is no door to the toilet. There is a barrier but if someone is in front of the entrance, you can see into the toilet. There is toilet paper but there is no soap and no paper towels.

I do not have a toothbrush – once during the time I was here I was given a single use toothbrush only

At midnight, after the meal, we are given the opportunity to shower if we want to. If we shower, there is shampoo and soap. We are also given a towel to use in the shower.

We are given deodorant when we take a shower.

I have not had the opportunity to launder my clothes and I am wearing the clothes that I was apprehended in.

8. I was given one paper describing my legal rights and informing me that I have the right to see an attorney or a judge. The paper was in Spanish. I was not permitted to keep the paper. When I arrived at the border, they told me that I had the ability to ask for asylum or to voluntarily return to my home country.

I do not have access to a phone during the day – the only time I was able to use the phone was the second day (Tuesday) to call my brother. On the same day, I was able to call my parents in El Salvador.

9. I have a brother who lives in Salinas. I would like to be released to my brother. I was given the opportunity to call my brother and I talked to him for about two minutes.
10. We have not been given the opportunity to go outside. There is a window in the room that I am in but the window faces a wall.
11. Yesterday I was told that I was going to be moved but they did not say where I was to be moved.
12. Most of the officers have been professional but two officers have made comments to me. Both were men and one of them had black hair with a black beard who spoke Spanish without an accent and the other one had a goatee and was bald who spoke Spanish with an American accent. The first officer said that everyone who was coming to the US was looking for a free ride and we were just all lying. The second officer said that we were all gang members and that the gang members in the US would kill me anyway.

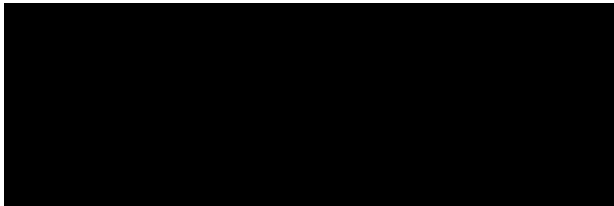

I, Sandeep S [REDACTED] (A number [REDACTED]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is February 27, 2001 and I was born in India. I am from India and traveled to the United States by myself. I speak Punjabi and do not speak any English other than a few phrases and words.
2. I crossed the border with the help of a "coyote" on June 12, 2018. In the vehicle crossing the border, the coyote was helping myself and someone else who is a stranger to me. After crossing the border, the coyote dropped me off. A border patrol agent stopped me while I was walking along the road. After being apprehended by the border patrol agent, I was brought to this border patrol detention facility.
3. When I was brought to this location, I was asked questions on a paper about what country I crossed from and how much I paid the "coyote."
4. I was not given any papers that told me about my rights or the ability to have a hearing in front of a judge.
5. I was not given a list of legal services providers or lawyers who might help me for free.
6. I was not allowed to keep any of the papers shown to me. I was asked by the agents who questioned me to sign a paper written in English and could not understand what I was signing. They did not explain the content of the papers I was signing to me.
7. I have been able to use the phone and was able to speak with my cousin. The only phone is kept in another room and you have to ask an agent to use it. The cousin I spoke with lives in New Jersey.
8. The only postings in the facility are in Spanish and I cannot read them, so I'm not sure if there are any legal advisals or lists of free legal services posted.
9. I do have a fear of returning to India because I fear for my safety.
10. The fear for my safety in India is because my father would get drunk and beat me up.
11. This domestic abuse is why I left India and came to the United States.
12. When I told the agent this, he told me they would send me back to India.

13. I left India on January 19, 2018. I travelled through seven or eight countries in order to come to the United States. Some of these countries include Columbia, Costa Rica, Honduras, Nicaragua, Panama, Guatemala, and Mexico.
14. The restrooms in this facility are not private and are in the open. The other five kids in my room can see when I use the toilet.
15. There is a sink to wash my hands, but it does not have soap or hot water.
16. My access to drinking water is only from the tap but there are no cups.
17. For food, I am given a filled tortilla, a package of crackers and some juice. I am given the filled tortilla twice a day, but I receive the crackers and juice an additional one to two times a day.
18. There is not enough food so I am always hungry and the filled tortilla does not taste good. I only eat it because I am so hungry. The filled tortilla is warm but not hot.
19. I have only been able to shower once since arriving at this facility. The shower is the only privacy I receive.
20. I have not seen a doctor since arriving here and wish to see one because I have a lot of phlegm, get cold at night, and do not feel well. But I have not asked to see a doctor.
21. The temperature where I am kept is too cold.
22. I have only been given a thin metallic blanket to keep warm, but I am still cold.
23. I had to sleep on the ground for one night, but I have been given a bed to sleep in the last two nights. I have not been provided with a pillow and only have the thin metallic blanket to cover myself. The temperature is too cold to sleep and the lights are left on all night making it hard to sleep.
24. I am detained in the same area as adults but kept in a separate room. The guards do not come around except to give us food.
25. I do not have access to anything to read or for entertainment. I have only been permitted to go outside about one to two hours the last two days.

I, **Manish K [REDACTED]** (A No. [REDACTED]) declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is 07/25/2000. I am 17 years old. I was born in Karnal, Harayana State, India. I left my home town because there was a political problem there for me and my family. I am a member of the INLD party along with my family. On December 24, 2017, my father and I were putting up posters of the INLD political party around my town when members of the BJP political party attacked and beat us. On February 15, 2018, we were attacked again so I had to leave my hometown for my safety.
2. Because I feared for my life, I left and flew to Ecuador to make my long journey into the United States. My trip was long and dangerous. I initially spent 10-15 days in Ecuador and then took a bus to Colombia. I then made my journey through the Panama jungle, Costa Rica, and Nicaragua. In Nicaragua I walked in the jungle for 3-4 hours until I could find another bus. I took another bus from Nicaragua to Guatemala and then Mexico.
3. In Mexico, I stayed in a camp and from that camp I took a plane to Tijuana. In Tijuana I stayed in a hotel but it was very dangerous there and there were a lot of gangs around. The gangs beat me up so I escaped and ran to the border of the United States yesterday. The gang was chasing me so I climbed the border wall and jumped over it. Once I jumped over the wall yesterday, the United States police arrested me around 11AM.
4. I do not have any family in the United States. The only person that I know is my father's friend who is here in US but I don't think he knows where I am. The detention facility I am staying in contacted my father's friend for me but they did not receive a response.
5. In the facility I am staying in, there is one large room with four beds. The beds have a mattress and a plastic cover. There is no sheet, blankets or pillows. I just have a thin plastic cover to sleep under. It is really cold in this room all the time. There is also a bright light that is on all the time, day and night.
6. There is a bathroom in the room but there is no door to it. If I use the bathroom, the other detainees can see me. There is a sink to wash my hands but there is no toothpaste, toothbrush, or soap for me to use. There is only cold water coming out of the faucet.
7. Since I arrived yesterday, I have had some food brought to my room. In the last 24 hours, I was fed cookies and juice only. There was nothing else provided. This morning I ate cookies and juice again.
8. I have been offered access to a telephone but I had no one to call.
9. Right now I feel sick and have fever and aches. I have pain in my back and body but I have not told anyone about that because I am scared. I also have not had a shower since I arrived yesterday.
10. When I arrived yesterday, I received some paperwork for me to sign. There was an interpreter available to help me. I was told to sign the paperwork but I did not understand what I was signing. The interpreter did not explain the paper work they just told me to sign it.
11. I was never told that I could have access to free legal assistance, or that I could ask for a court hearing.
12. No one has talked to me about my release.





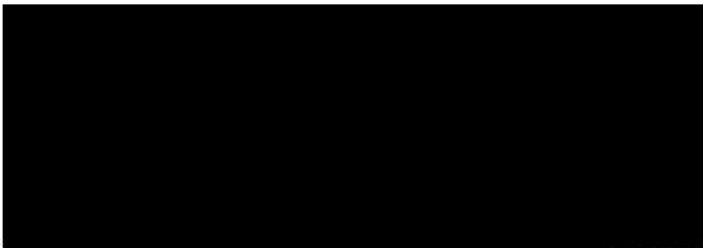
I, DEVIS U [REDACTED] (A number [REDACTED]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is July 30, 2000 in Guatemala. I am from Guatemala and traveled to the United by myself. I only speak Spanish and do not speak any English.
2. I left my home country because of the threatened violence against myself. I did not even tell my own mother I was leaving for the United States until I after left.
3. I was apprehended by presenting myself to Border Patrol agents near the border in San Diego on Monday June 11, 2018.
4. When I presented myself to the border patrol agents, there were three agents together. They instructed me to take off my shoes and belt and sit on the floor. I told them I didn't want to return to my home country because of threats I received. One border patrol agent told me they do not want any more Guatemalans in this country which scared and intimidated me. The second agent told me they would send me right back to Guatemala. The third agent told me people like me are why Trump has started his policies. All of the agents added to my fear and apprehension.
5. The temperature in this facility is too cold to be comfortable. I have only been provided a thin aluminum type blanket.
6. The first night, I had to sleep on a bench without a pillow or blanket. The second night, I still had to sleep on the bench without a pillow but was given a thin metallic blanket. Starting the third night, I was provided an uncomfortable bed, a blanket but still no pillow and the lights are left on all night. I am barely able to get any sleep because of the conditions.
7. My first night in detention I asked a guard for a blanket and the guard simply yelled no at me and told me to go to sleep.
8. I am not provided any books, magazines, entertainment, or any chance for exercise except one five-minute break in a caged area outside in the last five days. I spend the days trying to sleep but it's difficult to sleep because it is so cold.
9. The guards almost solely speak English to me and I cannot understand what they are saying.
10. I do not know what will happen to me next because the guards don't speak Spanish and that is adding to my fear. I miss my mother and am very worried about when I will get to see her.
11. The detention area does not have supervision and I am scared for my safety because all detainees are in the same area and I do not have anyone with me.
12. When I tried to ask a guard for information, he ignored me and closed the door in my face.
13. I have only been able to have one short conversation with my mother who lives in the United States when I arrived at the facility. There is not a telephone available in the facility.
14. In the restrooms, we have access to toilet paper but not hot water or soap.
15. After asking a guard if I could shower, I was told they do not have showers, soap, or towels available. I haven't been able to shower once in the four days since I've been here.
16. I also have not been able to brush my teeth since I arrived four days ago.
17. The border patrol agents told me about my right to have an attorney but only provided a list of attorneys in English. I wasn't given a copy of the list. I signed three documents when I arrived that were in English. An agent briefly described them to me in Spanish. One was about having a

hearing before a judge, another was about getting a free attorney, and I don't remember exactly what the third was about, but it had something to do with a judge. I didn't receive copies of the documents – they put everything into a folder.

- 18. The restrooms are not private and are out in the open. The sinks do not have hot water, nor is soap available.
- 19. In order to receive any water, I have to ask a guard in order to get a small cup of water.
- 20. I did not receive any food for a full day after apprehension.
- 21. The food I have received in the facility consists of one a small burrito that is not hot enough, two crackers, and juice for every meal. I have not been offered any fruit or vegetables. The quantity is not enough, and I have been hungry since I arrived.
- 22. My mother and my thirty-six-year-old sister currently live in the United States.
- 23. I believe both my mother and sister would be willing to provide me a place to live and support me.

I, Sachin K [REDACTED] (A number [REDACTED]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is August 2, 2001. I am from a village called Pangala, Haryana Province in India.
2. I left my village because it had become dangerous there. My father works for a political party called INLD. In December 2017, my father and I were returning home from an INLD meeting and four men from the BJP party stopped us. They beat me and my father. The four men told my father, "If you continue to work for the INLD party, we are going to murder you and your son." In February 2018, my father and I were returning from another INLD meeting. This time we were stopped by six men from the BJP party on our way home. The men beat me and my father with wooden sticks. They tried to kill me and my father. I saw some houses in the fields, so I ran towards those houses. When I started running towards the houses, the men who were beating my father ran away. We were both injured, and we were able to get some help from the people in those houses.
3. My father has not been able to return back to the village and now lives in the INLD office. He cannot leave because his life is in danger.
4. My mother and father are still in India, but it is dangerous for them too.
5. I left India on March 28, 2018. My father arranged for me to go to Delhi, India and take a flight from there to leave India. I passed through many places on my way to the United States. I passed from India to Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. From Addis Ababa I went to Sao Palo, then to Lima, then to a city in Peru which I think was called Ovito, then to Ecuador, then to Columbia, then through the Panama jungle, then to Costa Rica, then through the Nicaraguan jungle, then to Honduras, then to Guatemala, and then to Mexico. It was a very long journey and I was all by myself. It was dangerous and I was very scared.
6. I crossed into the United States yesterday, June 14, 2018, by climbing over the wall. Within seconds, the police had apprehended me. The police asked me my name and my birthday and where I came from. Then they put me on a bus and took me here.
7. When I got to this place, they took all my things and put them in a plastic bag. They told me that I could take one thing from the bag, so I took a t-shirt. The clothes I am wearing today are the clothes that I arrived in.
8. I slept last night in a room with five other kids. There are about ten beds in the room. I was given a bed and a two blankets. There were no sheets on the mattress, so I used one of the blankets as a sheet and slept underneath the other blanket. I was not given a pillow.
9. There is a light in the room. There is no way to turn the light on or off, but it doesn't bother me.

10. The temperature in the room was fine. I was very tired from my travels so I was able to sleep.
11. There is a toilet and a sink in the corner of the room. The toilet and sink are not closed off from the rest of the room, so when any of the six of us use the toilet, there is no privacy.
12. We were not given any towels or soap. I really wish we had some soap, but we were not given anything.
13. I saw some of the other kids going to take a shower. I haven't been able to take a shower yet since I arrived. I really want to take a shower, but I don't know how to ask.
14. Since I've gotten here, I was given one hot meal. I've also been given juice and cookies.
15. I don't have access to a drinking fountain or drinking water. I have just been drinking water from the sink in our room. I don't have a cup, so I drink water from the sink by cupping it in my hands.
16. This morning, we were allowed to go outside for a short period of time. There is a small fenced in area that is outside. I don't know exactly how long I was there for, but I think it was about an hour. We all just sat outside on a bench because there was nothing to do outside.
17. When I arrived here, they told me that in two days, I would be able to talk to a lawyer or a judge about my case.
18. Yesterday when I arrived, I was given a chance to call home. I tried the number for my parents, but nobody answered.
19. I came here to the United States for the purpose of saving my life. I don't have any firm plans, but I would like to go to school.
20. I think my father might have a friend who lives here in the United States. I hope that if I am able to talk with my parents, that I can get information about that friend and that they can help me.

I, Angel A [REDACTED] (A number [REDACTED]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is July 30, 2004. I am thirteen years old. My mother's name is [REDACTED] (A number [REDACTED]). My mother and I are from Mexico. We left Mexico to flee death threats from cartels who were demanding money from my mother.
2. My mother and I first crossed the border on May 7, 2018. We crossed a river, and immigration officers were on the other side waiting for us.
3. The immigration officers took my mother and me to La Hielera ("The Icebox") in Brownsville. As soon as we got there, the officers separated me from my mother. The officers interviewed my mom and me together. They told us that they couldn't hold us together. They told me that they were going to keep my mom there in Brownsville and that they were either going to deport me or put me in a camp. I was sad. I started crying.
4. The next day, the officers took my mom to court. About a half an hour later, they pulled me out of my cell. They didn't tell me why, and I didn't sign anything. They put me in a van and took me and another kid to the Mexican consulate, where we picked up two other kids. They took us to the middle of the bridge, and the Mexican police picked us up there in the middle.
5. The Mexican police took our information down and then they took us to a juvenile detention facility (DIF) in Matamoros. They put us in a room and took our photo and our information. We went to see a doctor and a psychologist. From there, they put us in a dormitory, where there were about six other boys from Central America. They were waiting to be deported. I was the youngest. I was able to bathe and they gave me food and clothes. They gave us a chat about drugs and STDs. In that place they hold kids who help people cross the border, and those children use drugs. No one explained to me how long I would be there, but they just told me I would be there until my mom or dad came to pick me up. Otherwise I would be sent to be adopted. I was very afraid.
6. When my mom came to pick me up, I was so relieved that I cried. I was so happy to see her.
7. My mother and I were still afraid for our lives, so we had to cross the border again on May 16, 2018. When we crossed the border, we were kidnapped by armed men, who held us in a house with about 120 other people for eight days. It was very scary. I didn't know what was going to happen to my mom and me.
8. Eventually the police came and shot the door of the house down so that we could all leave. They put us in a van and drove us about half an hour to the Rio Grande.

9. The officers took us back to La Hielera. They separated me from my mother again. I was very scared because I thought I might be deported away from her again.
10. After two days, the officers drove my mom and me to La Perrera ("The Dog Cage") in McAllen. When we got there, they separated me from my mom again. When we arrived to La Perrera, they made us sit on some benches. They gave us food, a cushion, and a metal blanket. They put me in a corner of the cell and separated me from the other boys because I am Mexican. We were all together in the same cell, but the guards made me and the other Mexican boys sit under the vent where it was coldest.
11. Every day, the guards told the boys in my cell that they were going to be adopted and that they would never see their parents again, that we were the property of the United States because we were on their territory. The ones saying all the mean things were wearing gray. The ones wearing green would sometimes comfort children or ask why they were crying, but not the ones in grey. One of the ones in gray made sure that the Mexican boys always stayed in our corner and never were able to sit near the other children, even when we were all together for lunch. He told us not to bother the other children or start fights, because all Mexicans are like that. He treated everyone but the Mexicans well. I felt I was being discriminated against. I was told I would be deported by an official, and it didn't matter that I came with my mom.
12. The guards were always waking us up in the middle of the night to do the list. The ones who didn't want to get up, the guards would kick. There were children as young as 5 in the cell, but the guards would shake them hard to wake them up.
13. The atmosphere in the cell was really hard. The children would cry constantly. Sometimes the mood would lighten – they would put on a movie – but then a guard would come by and say that the children would be sent away to live in a foster home and never see their parents again.
14. They called the consulate, who asked for my information, where I was going and why. I asked him why this call was happening? The consulate said it was so I could be deported.
15. In La Perrera, I could see that some of the other boys got to spend time with their parents, but only boys from Central America. I never got to speak with my mother, nor did any of the other boys from Mexico.
16. My mother and I were at La Perrera for six days. I don't know why we were there for so long. Every day I saw people leave and I didn't understand why we were still stuck there. No one explained to me what was going on.
17. After six days, my mother and I were brought here to Dilley on May 30, 2018. I don't know why we have been here for so long. Last week, my mom and I signed a paper to be released, and my family bought us tickets. But then we found out that we couldn't leave after all. We have been here for another eight days. When I found out we couldn't leave yet, it was really hard on me. It is making it difficult for me to sleep at night. I just want to know what is going to happen to us.

18. Today I found out that we received a positive credible fear determination. Soon we be released to go live with a friend in Houston. I am excited to get out of here and get past this nightmare.



1. My date of birth is October 5, 2003. I am fourteen years old. I am from Guatemala. I came here with my mother. We both speak Qeqchi. I speak some Spanish, and my mother only speaks a very little Spanish.
2. We arrived in Dilley three days ago. Before this we were in a closed house for seven days. And before that we were in an office for two days and two nights. Before that we had crossed a river to come to the United States. We walked about two hours looking for officials. Then we found the officers. They stopped us and told us to wait. They asked for our names, where we were from, and they took all of our things.
3. We went to an office with rooms. They separated me from my mom and put us in different rooms. My mom was in a room with only women, and I was in a room with only boys. I was in the room with boys thirteen and over. There was another room that had boys from about five years old to about twelve.
4. We had an interview, but they just asked our names and where we were from. I had trouble understanding what they were asking me because I don't speak very much Spanish.
5. After two days we went to a closed house. The officials there were not able to speak Qeqchi. We were there for seven days. We were separated from each other. I couldn't speak to my mother, I could only see her from far away.
6. They called my mom for an interview two times. She told me later that all they asked was how old she was, where she was from, and where she was from in Guatemala. They asked if she wanted to return to Guatemala. She said no, that she was scared to.
7. I was able to take a shower once, on the last day, after I had been at the closed house for seven days.
8. When we got here to Dilley, there was still no one who spoke Qeqchi to explain to us what was going on. I have no idea what I am doing here or what is going to happen next in my case.

I, **Griselda B [REDACTED]** (A number [REDACTED]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. I was born on May 24, 2002 in Guatemala. I am 16 years old. My mother is [REDACTED] (A [REDACTED]).
2. My mother and I came to the United States because our father had lived in America for 14 years and we were all alone. In our indigenous culture, it is not good to be living without a man. We were vulnerable.
3. We entered the United States at McAllen on Sunday June 17. We walked across the bridge and turned ourselves in to the immigration officials.
4. They took us a building and gave us water, a cookie, and juice. Then they put us in an extremely cold room. One by one, they called us out to ask for our information. They asked my age and where I was from. They did not tell me anything about my rights or that I had the right to a lawyer. They did not let me call anyone.
5. We spent the night in the cold room and were freezing. It was a small room with around 20 people. There was nowhere to sit except the concrete floor. We had only a silver blanket.
6. There was one toilet and sink for everyone in the cold room. We had toilet paper but no soap. We were covered with mud and did not have clean clothes. We were never offered a shower. We did not have toothbrushes, toothpaste, or towels.
7. The next morning, on June 18, we were taken to a location called the doghouse. We were there for five days.
8. At the doghouse, I was separated from my mother and put in a large caged area. There were sixty to one hundred girls there. Some of the girls were only 7 years old. It was very crowded. We were given sleeping mats and had to push them flush against each other to make enough room for everyone.
9. I was scared because I didn't know where my mother was. A lot of the girls were crying because they were afraid and missed their mothers. I saw girls ask where their mothers were, but the guard would not tell them. One girl kept yelling that

she wanted her mother. The guards screamed at her and asked her what she was doing here in this country.

10. In the five days at the doghouse, I never went outside for fresh air. The lights were on all the time and I didn't know if it was day or night. I started feeling very anxious and desperate.
11. I was only allowed to shower once, on the first day. We could only brush our teeth once per day. They gave us toothpaste to brush our teeth but would not let us keep it. There was one portable sink, but sometimes it didn't have any water and sometimes the soap would also run out.
12. There were six plastic toilets outside of the caged area. They were filthy and never cleaned and full stray toilet paper. At one point they took three of the toilets away. Afterwards, there was always a very long line for the toilets.
13. One very young girl had a very bad cough. She felt so sick that she did not line up to get food. I don't know whether she got medicine.
14. Nobody at the doghouse ever told me anything about my legal rights.
15. On June 23, the officials called me and made me go into another cage, where I saw my mother. I was so happy that I cried. We both cried.
16. We arrived by bus in Dilley on the afternoon of June 23.

I, Noredith P [REDACTED] (A [REDACTED]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is July 16, 2002. My mom and I are from Mexico.
2. We left because my mom started to receive threats that they would kidnap me. My mom and I have seen other young girls be kidnapped before. We think it is usually the Cartels. We were both very scared and did not know what to do because we knew the police would not do anything.
3. We presented ourselves at the border around June 6, 2018. We were taken to "La Hielera." It was impossible to sleep there. It was very cold. There were no beds or mats. We had to sleep on the concrete floor. There were toilets, but there was no privacy or doors. There were nothing to clean ourselves with like soap or toothpaste and we were never allowed to shower. We had only one pair of clothing to wear because the guards took away our other clothes. There was extreme wind and it was extremely cold.
4. Children would get a small juice. I was given one. We got two pieces of white bread and a piece of ham for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. We had a thermos of water but it tasted like chlorine.
5. It was extremely cold, making it difficult to sleep.
6. The light was always on and it was very bright and intense so it was impossible to sleep.
7. After two days, my mother and I were taken to another place where we were held for 2 days.
8. That place they called "La Perrera." It was extremely cold in this place as well. We were given one apple, one small bottle of water, a bag of chips, and a sandwich made of ham and two pieces of bread for each of the three meals. We were not given any additional water if it was not during breakfast, lunch, or dinner. The toilets were not pushing buttons to flush, but we had to empty the buckets of waste after the buckets were full. We were not able to shower and we were not given anything to clean ourselves like soap or toothbrushes. I do not know why it seemed like some people got to shower. It seemed like some people were able to only have a very fast shower and had to get out quickly. I was never able to sleep because I always felt worried that they would call my name or make me stand in the line. They would have us stand in line by our countries. The lights were always on, very bright and there was a breeze. I had to go to a different place than my mom where they put 15 and 16 year olds. They had the mats on the floor so they were all touching and we were very close to each other and it made it impossible to sleep. I did not know where my mother was or for how long I would be away from her.
9. For the entire trip and while we were kept in "La Perrera" and "La Hielera," we were not given documentation about legal services or access to counsel issues.
10. My mother and I were taken out of that facility on June 10, 2018.

11. My mother and I have been at the location in Dilley for about 19 days. The experience here is better with food and sleep. We are planning to stay with my aunt who lives in Los Angeles, California.

I, David C [REDACTED] (A number [REDACTED]), declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is September 5th, 2006. I am 11 years old. My son and I are from Honduras.
2. I was going to school and a gang tried to force me to carry drugs into the school and threatened to kill me if I refused. I told my mother what was happening and when my mother went to speak with them they attacked her. She has a scar on her face now from this experience. She went to the police but they told her that she could not prove that I was being threatened so we fled.
3. We presented ourselves at the border about June 22, 2016. We were taken to the place that they call "The Freezer". We had to take photos and put our names there. It was so cold--way too cold. We had to sleep on the cold concrete, which was very cold. They only gave us each one aluminum blanket and it did not do anything to keep us warm. We were not able to shower while we were there and they did not give us any extra clothing. We did not receive anything to clean ourselves. I was really worried being separated from my mom and I could not stop thinking about her all of the time. There were so many children with me in the place there that I could not lay down and I had to try to sleep sitting straight up but I was not able to. I was very sad and I kept crying. The food was okay but I ate it because I was very hungry and when I am very hungry I can eat something even if it does not taste good. I was very worried because I saw all of these other children there without mothers and I thought that my mom was taken to another place.
4. We were given one sandwich for breakfast, lunch and dinner and one small container of juice. The sandwiches were frozen but I was able to eat it.
5. They had air conditioning and it was so cold and we could not sleep and we were shivering. It was horrible. It felt like a freezer and I could not sleep because I was so cold. I wanted to sleep but I was scared because the guards would come by and kick us with their feet to wake us up if we would sleep. I was very tired.
6. They had lights and they were bright and always turned on. The toilets were very dirty and the toilet paper was on the floor. There were no doors for privacy. We had to go to the bathroom in front of everyone.
7. After one and a half days, my mother and I were taken to another place where we were held for two days.
8. They gave us two burritos per day and one apple each day. They also gave us one small container of milk to drink. I was able to sleep at this place because it was a little better to sleep on mats instead of the floor. The bathrooms were portable toilets. We were not able to shower the entire time that we were at

this place. I was separated from my mother but in this facility I could see my mother in the other cage so I thought that everything would be okay.



I, **Josue G** [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. I am 10 years old and I was born on September 15, 2007. I am from El Salvador.
2. I left El Salvador with my mother because of fear that the gangs were trying to kill us.
3. We presented ourselves at the border about May 2, 2018. I was taken to the "Perrera."
4. We were given a variety of foods to eat including burritos, tuna sandwiches, and ham sandwiches, which the majority of the time had a bitter taste to them. When the food was bitter tasting we knew it was spoiled and we would not eat it. With every meal we would get a bottle of water, I would store the water bottles to drink later because that was the only water that was provided to us.
5. The temperature at the facility was very cold. I was separated from my mother and placed with other boys in a cage. It was very cold, so the other boys and I would put some of the sleeping mats and blankets up around the cage to block some of the cold air from getting to us. When officials noticed what we had done with the mats and the blankets, they took all of the blankets away from us. When I asked for another, they would not give me one. My friend went to go ask for one and they gave it to him. He then shared that one with me.
6. The lights were on all the time and it made it difficult to sleep. We would use the blankets to cover ourselves to try to sleep. I was able to shower on the second day I was there. At first I wanted to shower, but when we I was given the opportunity to do so, I chose not to. The guards told another boy to tell me that I needed to shower, because I hadn't showered in a long time. They gave me liquid soap to wash, a toothbrush, and toothpaste to use just that one time. They took my clothes and washed them and while I waited for my clothes they let me borrow clothing that was too tight and uncomfortable.
7. After three days, I was reunited with my mom and we were both taken to where we are now. I have been here at Dilley for 54 days.
8. I have a liver condition and need to eat healthy foods like fruit and vegetables. There are not enough servings of fruit and vegetables to eat at Dilley. Although I enjoy eating the cafeteria food like pizza pockets, I know that they are not healthy for me and I wish that I had healthier food because of my liver condition.

I, Blanca R [REDACTED], A [REDACTED], declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My name is Blanca R [REDACTED], A [REDACTED]. She was born on March 1, 2001, and is 17 years old. My mother and I are both from Honduras.
2. We left Honduras because of a threat. A man came to our house about 5:00 pm one day. He had tattoos all over. Mom asked him if he needed anything and he seemed to know that we were alone. You too are very pretty and I know you are alone. He said "one way or another the two of you will be mine." The man made threats like he was going to kidnap and rape us. I was there and heard everything.
3. We crossed the river near McAllen and went to an office that was very cold, we call it an icebox. When we got there, a man told us we had to put our hands out and lift our shirts. He didn't touch us, but he said he was checking us. We sat in the icebox they gave us juice and one cookie. Then they took us to a room that was full of women. They gave us aluminum paper that the said was blanket and we slept on the concrete floor. I was scared.
4. While were there they gave us what they called a sandwich but there wasn't anything in between. My pants were wet because of crossing the river, but they didn't give me a change of clothes. They didn't ask me if I needed any medical care or even if I needed any water.
5. The next day, we were picked up together to go to the dog houses. Later they separated us into different cages. They took my Mom into one with other women. I was in a cage with about 10 other girls, ages from 14 to 17. There were about 3 cages, some of them had women with their children. They kept the men in ones that were really far away.
6. I knew that my mother was in a cage somewhere with other ladies because I saw a woman being taken somewhere. I didn't know exactly where my mother was, but knew that she was kind of far from me. They didn't allow me to be near my mother or talk to her.
7. I was there for 4 days. The second day, two men came to take me to an office to interview me. There were no women in the room. They didn't explain why I was separated from my Mom, they only told me that my Mom wasn't my mother and that she had false documents. He asked questions about our home life, where we lived, if we had any pets, things like that. He asked me where we were going and who was going to receive us. I told him that we were going with my father.
8. No one ever asked me anything else, where I needed medical attention, asked how I felt. No one told me anything about any rights I had. I didn't receive any papers or anything like that.
9. After the interview, they took me back to the cage and didn't ask me about that again.

10. While I was in the cage, I could get water if I asked. They gave us food three times a day. In the morning, they gave me a bottle water, and some very cold, round salted, toasted potatoes. At lunchtime, we would have burrito with ground beef and beans and an apple. The burrito was also cold. At dinnertime, another bottle of water they gave us potatoes like we had at breakfast, a ham sandwich and an apple. We never had any hot food. It was only cold, even the burrito.
11. We had blankets like we had in the other place, I call them aluminum sheets. We had cushions to put on the floor to sleep, but the lights were on all the time. They never turned off the lights. It was hard to sleep because they would wake us up 4 or 5 times a night to take roll or look for a particular girl. Sometimes they brought ladies to clean, but we had to clean also.
12. There were four portable restrooms for everyone and two sinks to wash our hands. The toilets were smelly. If I had to go the bathroom, I could go on my own, but at night they would go as a group because had to unlock the cages.
13. It was noisy in the cages because all the kids were crying. I cried too. With the crying and the lights it was hard to sleep at night. We never went outside and there were no windows so we couldn't tell if it was day or night. Sometimes if staff left and we could see an open door, we could tell if it was day or night.
14. The last day we were there, they called me to another cell and when I got there, my mother was there. I was very happy to see my mother. There were other women with their kids but didn't tell us anything about where we were going. They put us on a bus we were able to sit together on the bus, although we didn't know where we were or where we were going.
15. We arrived in Karnes in the afternoon, but didn't get to our room until the next day. They told us they would help us and explained all the rules. They gave us some food, a fruit, sandwich, cookies, a bottle of water. After we were finished with all the paperwork we finally had a chance to have a shower when we got to our room.
16. None of the employees explained our rights to us They gave us some papers about our rights. They were in Spanish I read them and understood some things but not others.
17. We have 3 meals a day, sometimes there is hot food, a variety. Some hot, some cold. I've had a chance to see a dentist here. I go with my mother to the doctor to her visits. I receive proper feminine products here. I also go to school here and I like being in school.
18. I don't want to go back to Honduras. I'm afraid to go back of being raped, kidnapped or sold. I want to be a lawyer when I grow up.

1. My date of birth is February 28, 2002. I am from Guatemala.
2. My father was receiving threats of extortion. He owned a shop in Gautemala, where he painted cars. He never told me what was happening, but I noticed that extorionists were calling his cell phone every time a job finished.
3. We presented ourselves at the border at Mexicali about 1 week ago. I believe that it was on or about June 22, 2018. We were taken to a facility in California. There was access to toilets, and food and water there, but no showers, and we had to sleep on the floor with only a bed sheet. There was no ventilation and no windows. There were 5 children and 5 adults – all males.
4. After 3-4 days, we were brought out of the facility and taken somewhere where we had to put our possessions in bags. We were then taken to a police station and we slept there for the night, on mattresses on the floor.
5. Next my father and I were taken to Berks where we are currently being held. When we arrived here, they made us throw out our bags with our personal possessions. My bag contained a sweater, shoes and pants.
6. At Berks, my father and I are kept together. We have access to toilets and sinks, we are fed three times per day, we can have fruit at anytime day or night, and shower at anytime. When I take a shower there's someone at the door, making sure everything is fine. There is medical assistance, the temperature is satisfactory, they have beds, and get 1 blanket per person, which is adequate.
7. My father was given documents with our rights, but received nothing about legal services.
8. My father has a close friend named [REDACTED] in West Palm Beach Florida, who we were supposed to stay with after crossing the border.

9. We had our interview for credible fear yesterday and we don't know the case or release status yet.



I, Jhony A [REDACTED], A number [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. I am sixteen years old. My date of birth is October 19, 2002. I am from Guatemala.
2. I was living with my grandparents in Guatemala because my mother is in the United States and my father is irresponsible and could not take care of me. My mother is ill and I want to live with her.
3. I crossed the border with three other youth. We crossed the border early in the morning and we were apprehended in Arizona early this morning, on July 11, 2018. We were found by park rangers and they offered us a bottle of water. The border patrol officers came to pick us up shortly after that.
4. When I first arrived at the CBP station I was given a burrito and a cookie and juice box. I was given a cup for water. About an hour after arriving they offered me another burrito and juice box for lunch. I was told I will be taken to Tucson shortly after lunch today.
5. I was a little hot on the car ride to the station. When I arrived I was placed in a room that was air conditioned. The temperature was ok. I was given a mat and a metallic blanket but I did not need the blanket.
6. The bathroom was clean and I had access to a sink with soap.
7. I was given a folder with some papers. I did not have any time to look through the folder to see what was inside. I was allowed to call the consulate and I was also able to call my mother to talk to her.

7. I was not given any information about my legal rights. I was not told what would happen next or where I would be taken. There was no list of legal services posted by the phone. I was able to call the consulate but not a lawyer. I was not asked if I wanted to speak to a lawyer.



7. I have not been given any legal notice or access to counsel.




1. I am sixteen years old. My date of birth is May 26, 2002. I came here from Guatemala without my parents. I was with a group of three other minors.
2. I left Guatemala because of my fear of the 13 gang.
3. I left Mexico around 3:00 in the morning to cross the border. I was apprehended at the border of Arizona on the morning of July 11, 2018. We were taken to the Ajo CBP facility. I was located in the desert by park officers. The park officers offered us water. They called CBP officers and two officers came to pick us up. We waited about five minutes to be picked up. When we were picked up, we were driven to the CBP station. I don't know how long it took to get there because I fell asleep in the car.
4. When we arrived they took my things and then brought us into the facility. We were given a mattress and then sent to a room with the two other boys I came with. The girl we were with was sent to another room. We stayed in the room about 30 minutes. The room temperature was ok during the time we were there. I have long pants and a long sleeve shirt on. I was also given a metallic blanket which I did not need.
5. I was given a burrito, a cookie and juice as soon as I arrived. I was provided a cup to drink water from the bathroom sink.
6. In the room I was held in, there was a bathroom with a sink & toilet. The sink had soap and I was able to wash my hands.
7. I was not provided any paperwork explaining my rights or a list of legal services. I did meet with an attorney on the Flores case who explained my rights under Flores. I was allowed to call the Guatemalan consulate from the CBP station. I was not given the opportunity to call my family.

1. I, Diego M [REDACTED] A 215 767316 declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

2. My date of birth is 10/17/2003 I was born in Cacerio, Paculam Solola, Guatemala. I came to America to join my father in Texas.

3. I traveled through Mexico to the US with Guatemalan boys I met in Mexico. We were arrested by the migra almost as soon as we entered the U.S. I was exhausted so I do not remember a lot but a medical person looked at us and especially our arms. I don't know what they were looking for but maybe to see if we were sick or maybe they were looking for tattoos. I do not have any tattoos. Then, they put us back in a van and took us to a place they call La Hielera. My clothes were wet.

4. I said to join my father. They put me I in a room for about three days with seven people. There were men and younger children and three boys my age who I crossed the river with. They gave us water in a large bottle with paper cups.

5. I was hungry. Then much later they gave us a dry sandwich with something like meat. It was really cold there and very hard to sleep. We only got a sort of cape made of aluminum and we had to sleep on the floor. It was really hard to sleep. I could only sleep about a half hour at a time. I didn't know what time it was because we could not see the sun or sky at all. I was not too scared but I was feeling very sad and I felt a little sick.

6. After three days they brought all three boys including me in a van to Casa Pedro. We were taken to the medical unit immediately and then I was placed in a room by myself for eight days. I stayed there almost all the time. Sometimes I was able to talk to other boys if they passed in the hall. I was let out for a short time each day. I asked them why I had to stay in the room. I think it was because they thought I was sick but I told them I was not sick. I did not want to be alone.

7. Since I arrived here at Casa Padre I have been able to talk to my mother in Guatemala and my father who is in Houston, but only for ten minutes, which is not enough time. I need to talk about what I should do and about all the things that I need to decide. I want to see my father. My father said he will see me when I am released but I don't know when that will be. I don't know if there is a plan to help me leave. No one will tell me. I cannot leave. All the doors are locked and I would be in trouble if I left.

8. I do not remember being given a paper about my rights. No one explained to me what I need to do if I want to leave Casa Padre. I think the counselor and my case manager have talked to my father but they have not told me anything about how I can see him or leave here. No one explained that I could request a hearing before a judge. I was given a piece of paper with a list but I didn't really know what to do with it. I don't know what happened to it. I did not understand I could talk to an attorney. I do not remember anyone telling me I had any rights

9. I think I have been here for about 23 or 24 days. I do meet with a counselor about once a week by myself. She said she hopes I will be able to leave soon but I do not know what I have to do or what my father has to do for me to leave. I do not have group sessions with the counselor. The food is OK but sometimes there is not enough. We cannot get a second plate of food.

KEVIN Y [REDACTED]

I, Kevin Y [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is October 24, 2000. I am 17-years old. I was born in Honduras.
2. I arrived in the United States on or about June 26, 2018.
3. After crossing the border, I walked for a while and then encountered immigration officers. The immigration officers first took me to a *hielera* in Texas, where I was held for about nine hours. I was cold, I had no blanket, and no way to warm myself. There were open toilets with no privacy. I was given a sandwich to eat – just two pieces of bread with bologna. There was no soap and no showers and no chance to brush my teeth. The bright lights were on all the time.
4. From the *hielera*, I was taken to *la perrera* on a bus. *La perrera* was very ugly and bad. I had to spend two terrible days there. The officers treated us worse than dogs. They yelled at us, and kept us locked in cages. I was in a cage. It felt like there were a ton of people in the cage with me. My guess is that there were 40 to 50 children in the cage with me. Some of them were teenagers like me. Others were much younger, including children only four and five years old. The little children were crying and crying. They did not have their parents with them. There was no one to care for them. The guards did not care that the little kids were crying. We were only given very cold food in *la perrera* – food that is supposed to be eaten warm – and we were given the same food at every meal. I felt so very cold in *la perrera*. I was given only a very thin blanket. This was not enough to keep me warm. I was only allowed to brush my teeth once in *la perrera* and take one shower there.
5. From *la perrera*, I was taken to Casa Padre. No one told me why I was being taken here. Since I entered Casa Padre on June 28, 2018, I have never left, not even for a minute.
6. I feel very sad and anxious here at Casa Padre because I want to leave. I really want to leave. But I do not know how to leave.
7. I would like more time to talk on the phone. Until yesterday, I was permitted to only make one phone call each week, for just 8 to 10 minutes. Until yesterday, all of my phone calls at Casa Padre have been in the presence of a case manager without any privacy. I do not feel comfortable having a full conversation in a case manager's

presence. Yesterday, for the first time, I was brought to a booth where I was permitted to make a private call for only 8 minutes.

8. I need more time to make private phone calls to my cousin in the United States. I need to talk with him about how to leave this place and how I am feeling about being here. I need to talk with my cousin about my legal situation and my immigration questions.
9. I really need to talk with my cousin because I do not have a lawyer or anyone else to guide me. But I cannot speak to my cousin on the phone when I need to.
10. My father raised me and he is still in Honduras. I miss him dearly. But I am afraid to call my father because it will be interpreted as me wanting to return to Honduras.
11. All the misters and misses and the staff who work here tell us, "You cannot touch the phones. You'll get in trouble if you touch even one button. Don't touch that."
12. I know about one boy who put a phone to his ear. He didn't even make a call, but he got written up with a disciplinary report. This will affect his case, meaning that he will have to stay at Casa Padre longer. The misses and the misters and the staff tell us that all reports go into the computer, and that boys with reports are detained at Casa Padre longer, even though their release paperwork may be ready. This is how discipline works at Casa Padre.
13. I know another boy who went to a door, just to try to look outside. He didn't want to escape, he just wanted to see the other side of the door. He was punished. The staff designated him as an escape risk. He was given a one-to-one, meaning a mister needs to accompany him and monitor him at all times, all throughout the facility.
14. If any child tries to leave Casa Padre without permission, the misses and the misters and the staff will make a report. The report will go into the computer, and the child will be detained at Casa Padre even longer.
15. If a child does manage to escape Casa Padre, immigration will be called, and the child will be put in prison and deported. The staff and misters and misses tell us this every few days. They told me this yesterday.
16. If a child says that he wants to leave Casa Padre without permission, he is not permitted to go outside at all.
17. No one has ever explained anything about the *Flores* settlement agreement to me.

18. No one has ever told me that a lawyer or an immigration judge can help me leave this place.
19. No one has told me that I can leave Casa Padre promptly.
20. Last week, my teacher asked us if anyone would like to talk with lawyers. I raised my hand.
21. At some point last week, after I raised my hand for a lawyer, I was brought to the cafeteria with seven other children. There a lady wearing regular clothes – not a uniform like the misses and misters and staff at Casa Padre – told us that we had to sign a paper for something about lawyers. I did not really understand what she meant. But after I signed the paper, I was given a yellow folder. The folder had a packet of paper inside, all of which were in English. The packet had a list with phone numbers for lawyers. This is the first time I was given a list with the phone numbers for lawyers. I received a separate piece of paper in Spanish too.
22. All of my movements at Casa Padre are monitored. I cannot do anything freely here.
23. I cannot go anywhere in Casa Padre alone. I need to have seven other children with me at nearly all times.
24. I cannot move from one part of Casa Padre to another, unless I am escorted by a staff member and have permission to do so.
25. During my time at Casa Padre, I have needed medication several times. No one in my family was consulted before I was given medication.
26. Sometimes the food here is not good. After eating the meals, I sometimes feel hungry. Sometimes there is not sufficient food, and I wish I could have more to eat. Dinner is served around 5 p.m. By about 9 p.m. I am hungry again. Although we are permitted snacks like crackers, there is just not enough food for me.

I, Elmer E [REDACTED] declare under penalty of perjury that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

1. My date of birth is October 5, 2002. I am from Guatemala.
2. I traveled without any family or friends. I was arrested by myself near the Rio Grande in Texas in late January 2018. I was taken to the Border Patrol station warehouse. The border patrol station was very cold and I was only given an aluminum blanket that did not keep me warm. I was very scared because I did not know what was going to happen to me. I was not able to talk to any of my family at the border patrol station. I was there for about a day.
3. I was then transferred to Casa Padre, where I am currently held. I have been here for six months. I do not know how long I will be kept here and when I will be able to leave.
4. I am not able to leave Casa Padre. If I try to leave Casa Padre, I am afraid that they will send the police or Border Patrol after me and it will affect my immigration case.
5. At Casa Padre, they write reports on children acting up and breaking rules. I am afraid that if I get any report on me, I will not be released and it will affect my immigration status. They will also take away my play activities. These kind of rules make me feel like I cannot act like a kid like I used to. I have discussed this with other children here and they feel the same way.
6. When I first got to Casa Padre, I was then given about nine injections. I am not sure what they were but I think they were vaccinations. They also took blood from me. I do not think that they got permission from my parents to give me the shots or to take blood. And I did not have the option to refuse to get the shots or for them to take my blood.
7. I have a toe injury from playing soccer. I have received treatment for it but my parents did not consent to the treatment. They did not know about my injury until I was able to speak to them during my weekly call.
8. I do not know what else I can do or need to do to get released from Casa Padre. I have not spoken to an attorney who can help me or advise me and my mother about my legal rights. I want to and need to talk to an attorney about my legal rights. I do not know whether I have the right to appeal my placement at Casa Padre or to find out about other placements that are better for me. I do not know whether I have the right to file a grievance with an immigration judge or what any of my legal rights are to help me.
9. I was never made aware of the Flores Settlement and my rights under the settlement until I spoke with the volunteer attorneys in the Flores case today. After I said I would see the lawyers, I thought I was going to see attorneys who could help me get out of Casa Padre and reunite with my family in the U.S.

10. I do not presently have access to an attorney, but I need one right now to help advise me and my family about next steps I need to take. I previously went to immigration court without an attorney. I was told I needed to find an attorney because I need to go back to Court on August 15, 2018. I have not been given a list of attorneys and I do not know how to contact one for help.

11. I have no idea when I will be reunited with my family here in the U.S.


